DEVILISH DOROTHY WON IN SIX HEATS

Dr. Sharper Got the Flag at Charlottetown with Second Money in Sight—Three Good Races.

Charlottetown, P.E.I., Sept. 26.—Six thousand people witnessed exhibition races today, the feature of which was the 2.17 trot won by the fifteen year old mare Devilish Dorothy, that took the last three of six heats, Dr. Sharper being distanced with second money in sight.

The 2.40 pace and three-year-old trot were tame events, Moth Miller and Harvest Bells winning easily, distance being waived.

Columbus, O., Sept. 26.—The American horse breeders' futurity, for three-year-old pacers was won at the Grand Circuit meeting today by Robert Gatewood, who disposed of the field as he pleased. Four of the six horses were shut out by him in the first heat.

Directum J. won handily the 2.08 pace. He paced each mile in 2.05¼.

The 2.15 trot was the big battle and after five heats it went over for decision tomorrow. Michailowa and Lottie Watts are left to pace the deciding heat.

Rascal gave the talent a big jolt in the 2.13 pace. He sold for \$10 in a ticket worth around \$175. Ublan Simmons finished third, while Rascal won easily.

HOOF PRINTS.

George W. Leavitt has bought the 4-year-old half-brother to Anna Bradford, 2.00¾. Brandford Man, by The Northern Man, 2.06¾.

Peter Vaughn, who was second to Early Dreams last Tuesday in 2.05¾, has changed owners and is now a member of the Murphy stable.

The Vermont bred pony, Little Batic, second in 2.01½, comes close to qualifying as the surprise pacer of the year.

Dr. Harry Watson's Colonel, 2.12¼, has won eight races. Last week the pride of Haverhill placed the Gotham, Me., track record at 2.12¼.

Allie Lou, 2.06½, is the present trotting sensation of the Pacific coast. She is a nibred McKinney, being by Kinney Lou, 2.07½, out of Lady Zombro.

The contest for the honor berth among the season's money winning trotters is interesting. The Real Lady, Early Dreams and Busy's Lassie make up the field.

Walter Cox worked John Farnum's pacer, A Game of Chance, a mile in 2.02¼ last week. Some of the circuit followers rate this fellow as the best pacer Cox has ever trained. This horse formerly was owned by W. B. Lint of Fredericton.

SAID VICTORIA ESTABLISHED A NEW RECORD

Won Three Races in Week at Halifax, All Better Than 2.20—Fastest Maritime-Bred Mare.

What is thought by a number of horsemen to be a world's record was the performance of the trotting mare Victoria, owned by Dr. D. H. McAllister of Sussex, at the recent Provincial exhibition at Halifax in having won three races within one week, and having trotted every heat better than 2.20 on a half mile track. On September 14, driven by Marratty, she won the 2.19 trot in 2.19, 2.19½, 2.18¾, (second heat won by Cochato Lady in 2.19¼) and on September 17 won the 2.24 trot in 2.18½, 2.20, 2.19¼. On September 20, driven by Boutilier she won the free-for-all trot in 2.18½, 2.18¾, 2.18¾.

Three years ago Helen R., owned by Captain D. A. McKinnon, Charlottetown, won three races at Halifax within a week, with every heat from 2.16½ to 2.19½, but she was a pacer. Noted turf statisticians will be asked if Victoria's performances established a record. Victoria is the fastest trotting mare ever bred in the Maritime Provinces, having made a record of 2.15¼ at Bangor this season.
