A. C. FLEMING ASSISTANT HEALTH INSPECTOR.

Inspection of Premises Now Going on
---After Unlicensed Milk-
Dealers.

The Fredericton Board of Health met last night and deal with the matter of inspection of premises by the officials of the board. It was reported that a portion of the city already had been inspected.

Some premises had been found in satisfactory condition, and some had not. Inspector McKay was instructed to proceed with the work and also to secure the services of another inspector whom he would select for himself. Mr. Alex. C. Fleming has been selected by Inspector McKay to assist him.

Licenses have been issued by the Board of Health to eighteen milk dealers. A number of unlicensed dealers are doing business in the city, but the board is taking steps to deal with them.

GORKY PREDICTS MORE TROUBLE

London, May 11.—A Petrograd despatch to the Daily Express says:

"Maxim Gorky, whose anti-British outbursts and assertions that Dr. Paul Milukoff, the Russian foreign minister, is in the pay of Anglo-French capital, daily marks the columns of his newspaper, New Life, foreshadows another political crisis in which the council of workmen's and soldiers' delegates will endeavor to retrieve their position. The council is very angry at the course of recent events.

HUN ATTACKS WERE REPULSED

London, May 11.—German attacks were delivered last night on the British positions east of Arleux and to the south of Souchez river. All the assaults, in one of which liquid fire was employed, were repulsed.

The official announcement of these operations and others on the front in France, reads:

"Early last night the enemy attacked our positions east of Arleux and south of the Souchez river. He was repulsed in each case by our artillery and machine guns. At the latter point the enemy made another attack later in the night, assisted by "flammenwerfers." He was again driven off. We made a successful raid last night east of Ypres."

ACTIVITY IN MACEDONIA

London, May 11.—An official statement issued today by the British war office reporting military operations in Macedonia says: "On the night of Wednesday after a heavy bombardment the enemy attacked our new positions southwest of Krastali, three miles southwest of Doiran town."

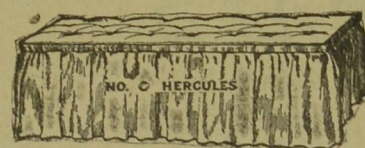
"He obtained a momentary footing on Goldies' Hill which we held as an advanced post in front of the centre of this line, but he was immediately driven off by our counter-attacks."

FLOATING DOCKS FOR SYDNEY

Sydney, May 11.—The purchase of a floating dry dock to be used in repairing smaller class of steel and wooden ships is announced today by the Sydney Foundry Co. This is a composite dock and is expected to arrive in Sydney in a few weeks.

The company have arranged for the purchase of new machinery to build marine engines and ship equipment, having been frequently offered extensive contracts for ships' equipment by the British admiralty. According to well founded reports this is only a forerunner of what will doubtless be the greatest shipbuilding industry in eastern Canada.

RISE IN WATER IS RESULT OF RAINS

Nashwaak Drive Coming Along Well
---Upper Corporation Drive
Out Tomorrow.

The water in the St. John river at this point has risen slightly as the result of the rains of the past three days. The streams in this section of the province also are rising. Reports from the Nashwaak are that the rains were not as heavy on the headwaters of that stream as in this vicinity. There was a slight rise, however. The rear of the Nashwaak Pulp & Paper Co.'s drive will be clear of Lower Lake today and the head will be near Ryan Brook. Driving on the Nashwaak has been hard but the lumber will come out. The dams have not been used on this stream yet and will not be until the drive is below Stanley.

The upper corporation drive on the St. John river, which is under the direction of Mr. W. J. Noble of this city, will be at Big Rapids tomorrow, almost finishing operations on that section of the river. Conditions for driving have not been so good on the upper St. John for many years.

ENEMY LOSSES ARE VERY HEAVY

Paris, May 11.—Four fresh German divisions have been observed on the Aisne front since May 7, says an official summary of the operations on May 4 to 6. He statement adds:

"This is irrefutable proof of how rapidly these effectives are being used up. German losses in these three days exceeded all estimates."

TO COPE WITH THE SITUATION

Petrograd, May 11.—Twelve members of the Council of Soldiers' and Workmen's delegates, including the president, have gone to Schlussemburg to cope with the situation created by the district committee in declaring itself an autonomous unit.

DEBATE ON ADDRESS.

House Resumed This Afternoon —
Chairmen of Principal Standing
Committees Recommended.

The House of Assembly resumed at three o'clock this afternoon, when Hon. J. A. Murray began the debate on the Address.

This morning the committee appointed to strike Standing Committees met and attended to its duties. The following chairmen will be recommended to the House: Mr. Fred Magee of Westmorland, Public Accounts; Hon. J. P. Burchill of Northumberland, Standing Rules; Mr. A. T. LeBlanc of Restigouche, Municipalities; Hon. F. J. Sweeney of Westmorland, Corporations; Mr. D. W. Mersereau of Sunbury, Agriculture.

Taken Back to St. John.

Otho Bostwick of St. John, who was arrested here on the charge of deserting his wife and family was taken back to St. John last night by Detective Briggs of the St. John police force. Bostwick was located at Victoria Mill where he was employed. He had shaved off his moustache and altered his appearance. He left his wife and several children with seven cents. A woman belonging to Koswick, who lives apart from her husband was in Bostwick's company while he was in Fredericton. The Children's Aid Society of St. John acted in the matter.

NOTED DOCTOR DEAD AT PARIS

Paris, May 11.—Dr. Louis Landousy, dean of the faculty of medicine of the University of Paris, is dead.

WHEAT STILL ON UP GRADE

Chicago, May 11.—Highest peaks in wheat prices were again overtopped today. The best explanation obtainable was that scattered buying on the part of houses with eastern connections proved of more than sufficient volume to counter-balance available offerings. Opening quotations, which ranged from half a cent to three cents advance, with May at 3.18 and July at 2.47 1-2 to 2.49, were followed by a sharp general advance carrying May to 3.19 and July to 2.52 1-4. September made a still greater jump 5 3-4 to 6 1-4 and touched 2.15.
