HOUSEHOLD HELPS.

Buttermilk Pancakes.

One quart of buttermilk, or sour milk, a little salt and a teaspoon of baking soda, flour enough to make it thin, one egg or two beaten well. Fry in a little lard. Use maple syrup over them.

Cookies.

Chill the dough of which cookies are to be made. This will make the cookies crisper and keep the dough from sticking to the board when it is rolled. Put it on the ice for an hour or so after it is mixed.

Prune Bread Pudding.

Chop stewed prunes and put them in alternate layers with bread in a buttered baking dish. Sweeten them to taste and pour the juice in which they are stewed over them. Stand aside for two hours and then bake until done. Serve with a meringue or with cream.

COLLAR AND CUFF SET.

For this set you will need two hand-

kerchiefs, from which you can make two collars and one pair of cuffs. For the collars cut a handkerchief in half and run as many tiny tucks as are required to reduce the length to nine and a half inches. It is quite easy to draw threads in handkerchiefs, and this enables you to keep the tucks absolutely straight and an equal distance from each other. The tucks should extend from the cut edges. Black velvet ribbons caught together, with a tiny brooch, provide a dainty finish and keep the upper edge of the collar trim and close to the throat.

BARREL SILHOUETTE.

This year something really different is appearing in the form of the barrel skirt. The waistline is quite normal, while the line from the hip to the knee is distended considerably, then diminishes as it nears the shoe top. The cut and general style suggest the Spanish bolero.

COBB AND HERZOG
IN FIST FIGHT AT
TRAINING CAMP

Began on Field and Was Continued In Hotel---Cobb Had Better of Lively Scrap.

Dallas, Tex., April 2.—The sequel of the impromptu battle between Ty Cobb and "Buck" Herzog on the ball field on Saturday afternoon came several hours later when the men engaged in a stand up fight in the Georgian's hotel and Herzog took a sound thrashing.

The New York player served notice on Ty at dinner that he would be in his room at 8 o'clock ready to fight it out and was told by the Peach to come all spraddled out, arrayed in his old clothes.

Buck with his seconds was on hand at the appointed hour. The furniture was moved out, the men stripped to the waist and went at it. They fought probably five minutes before Herzog announced that he had enough, and shook hands with his conqueror.

During the battle Buck was somewhat cut up around the face, while Ty did not have a mark. Cobb scored a couple of knockdowns.

So far as trouble between these two men is concerned, the big fight will restore harmony, but Ty sticks to his determination not to play any more games in the series.

"If I get back in the game I will have to fight a lot more of them," he said, "and I don't propose to be shown up as a rowdy. If they only bring on McGraw now, I will be satisfied."

Changed His Mind.

The battle between Cobb and Herzog, which threatened to disrupt the series of exhibition baseball games between the N. Y. Nationals and Detroit Americans, has been amicably settled, and the series will be played as scheduled.

Matters have been satisfactorily adjusted. After the fight in the hotel Cobb and Herzog became reconciled and attended a banquet given to the visiting players.

RED SOX MAKE
GOOD SHOWING IN
SPRING PRACTICE

Batting and Fielding Both Good--- Boston Nationals Not Hitting But Work Well in the Field.

Boston, April 3.—The spring "world series" between the teams that fought for the supreme honors last fall is now bringing considerable credit to the Champion Red Sox. Starting with a handicap of two straight losses, they have displayed their old 1916 fighting spirit, succeeding in bringing the series to a tie at three wins each.

In the first batting and fielding averages of the year the world champions made a superior showing, their team batting being .284, as against .247 for Brooklyn, and their team fielding .980, as against .972.

Hoblitzel leads in individual averages at .571, with Cady marked at .500, Manager Barry and Gahner at .417 each and four other regulars at .300 or better.

The Braves are shaded by their opponents in hitting, but have all the better of the fielding. Their team batting is .233, as against .248 for the Athletics and New York Americans; their fielding is .960, as against .934. The "rookie" outfielders are outclassing the regulars in hitting to date, all three being well above the .300 standard. Gowdy is the only regular of the team to show in the class.

Despite their low hitting, the Braves have an edge of one game on their American League rivals, having won two out of three from the Athletics and split even in the four-game series with the Yankees.

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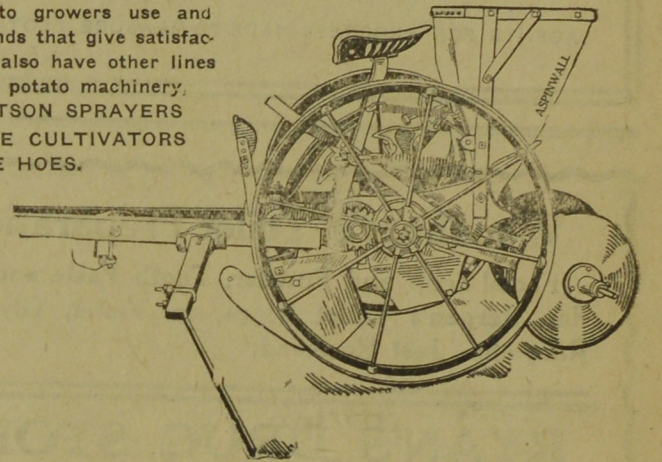
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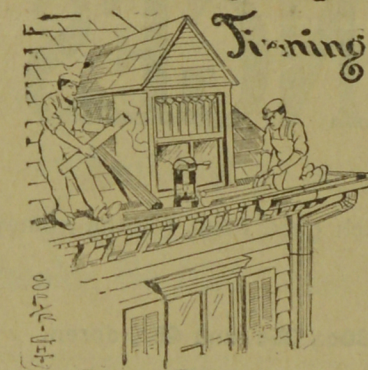

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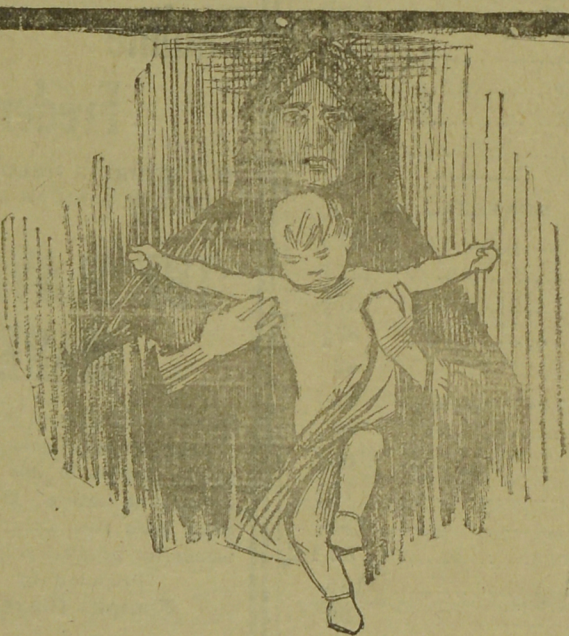
