

## City Coal Contracts.

City coal contracts were awarded by the City Council last night. The Minto Coal Co. was given the contract for 800 tons of best screened Minto coal to be delivered at the Pumping Station for \$6.05 per ton. Mr. R. T. Baird was awarded the contract for 100 tons of Sydney screened coal to be delivered at the Pumping Station at a price to be determined by market conditions. This coal is to be used in emergencies. A contract for 100 tons of Minto coal to be delivered at the City Hall, for \$6.05 per ton, was awarded to the Min-to Coal Co. Mr. R. T. Baird was giv-en the contract for 600 tons of Sydney coal to be delivered at the Street Lighting Plant for \$8.00 per ton.
