## HON. MR. CARVELL'S POSITION.

The Ottawa correspondent of the Toronto News, who is evidently in close touch with political affairs at the capital, seems to be under the impression that the union government proposition has not made much of a hit in New Brunswick. A recent despatch to his paper contains the following, which will be read with considerable interest here:

"Outside of the Province of Quebec the only province where apparently the new government is not being received with enthusiasm is New Brunswick. The people of New Brunswick have always taken their politics with a passionate intensiveness, which it is difficult to appreciate in Ontario and the West. They are not only vigorous in their political predilections, but they work at their politics from January 1 to December 31. Judging by the wires which are being received at the capital, the people of New Brunswick think that Sir Robert Borden and Hon. Frank B. Carvell have suddenly been seized with a fit of madness and should be locked up in an asylum. They are evidently absolutely dazed—the Conservatives that Sir Robert should include such "a political highbinder" in his cabinet, the Liberals that Mr. Carvell would ever consider associating himself with the leader of "a rotten Conservative administration."

"The howls of protest have been equally strong from each political camp. Mr. Carvell, it may be added, was the man who was chiefly responsible for the downfall of the Flemming government through his pitiless exposure of scandals. The Conservatives fairly hate him, and the Liberals had been led by him to believe that Sir Robert's government was the last word in sordid political corruption.

As for Mr. Carvell's position, no man in the new government has been actuated in accepting office by higher motives or more intense patriotism. Acceptance of office under Sir Robert Borden was an exceedingly serious step for him and he has made the move with no mere desire to secure a portfolio. Mr. Carvell is not built that way. He realized that as far as his own province was concerned he would be doing the popular thing to refuse the office, that he would be flying in the face of public opinion, and that he was endangering his political future. He has entered the new union government only from a sense of patriotic duty. He will devote himself to his portfolio with all his intense energy, great capacity and almost passion for work. He will give the country his best, and he will give Sir Robert Borden loyal support—no Conservative need doubt that. He would never have entered the government if he had not been impressed by Sir Robert's earnestness, sincerity and patriotism in his desire to form a union government.

"However, it is evidently going to take New Brunswick some time to recover from the blow. It is intimated that New Brunswick may have a second cabinet minister. While nothing official has been given out yet, it is possible that Sir George Foster will return to his native province and run again in his old county, York, where he was elected in 1896 by over 1,500 majority. Such a move would be pleasing to both Liberals and Conservatives in New Brunswick."

Ottawa Citizen: "Mr. Carvell may take credit for helping so thoroughly to clean up the provincial political situation in New Brunswick, including the compulsory retirement of Mr. J. K. Flemming from the Premiership, and the elimination of the corrupt Conservative government. Having given the country such evidence of fearlessness in wielding a two-edged sword against internal enemies, Mr. Carvell has now the opportunity, in a union government, of demonstrating what can be done in the constructive task of organizing the resources of Canada for national service instead of for private gain."

A position at Washington with a salary of \$25,000 a year attached ought to suit Hon. J. D. Hazen right down to the ground. The ex-Minister would be able to spend his time hobnobbing with diplomats, attending banquets and delivering after dinner

speeches. Hon. Mr. Hazen is a good mixer and would no doubt fit in well at Washington.

Prominent Liberals of Nova Scotia have been in caucus this week considering the political situation. Premier Murray declined to make any statement, but he will meet Sir Robt. Borden and give his decision as to whether or not he will join the union cabinet.

The announcement in Ottawa that New Brunswick has been created a separate military district should be pleasing news to the people of this province. It is hoped that the change will not mean any large addition to the number of home defenders now going about in khaki.

An Ottawa despatch says that the oyster fisheries at Richmond, P. E. I., the home of the famous Malpeque, are a complete failure this season. The output in this province is reported to

be equal to that of last year.

Strikes among coal miners in different parts of the United States are not calculated to help out the fuel situation.
