## BILLY SUNDAY RAPS NEW YORK SOCIETY AND IT'S SINS

New York, April 24.—New York is waking up to Billy Sunday, if the crowds at the meetings yesterday are any indication. The police estimate that at least 40,000 persons swarmed the Tabernacle last evening, twice as many as the edifice would hold. The doors, usually left open until 8, were closed at 7 with as much difficulty as the subway doors closed on the squirming and seething mobs that fought their way for standing room in the uptown trains. Many among the audience were clergymen who had closed their own churches in order to hear the revivalist.

Billy Sunday responded to the spirit of the occasion. His collar did not last above half an hour; and when it was hopelessly wilted he tore it off, threw it down and proceeded to "lam-baste" society for its sins—society with a small "s" for some of the society that Billy panned was of the East Side and Bowery type.

"If you must smoke," he cried—"and you will be a better Christian if you don't—light up the old briar, but cut

out the filthy cigarette. And if there's anybody I hate it's an old nasty tobacco chewer. He's nothing but a hog."

On the morals of "society" women he showed his usual eloquence.

"The fool mother that allows a little sixteen-year-old sissy to float around town joy-riding at all hours of the night, with a counterfeit sport of weak mind and weaker morals, opens the way to sin, disgrace and shame."

"The modern sultor is wise. It is as hard to pass off a girl that has been pawed over by different fellows six nights a week with the lights turned down, as it is to fatten sheep on pineapple juice."

He is strong for President Wilson in the present crisis, though he did not vote for him. He believes in capital punishment, he said, "because it is Biblical."

In the afternoon also the Tabernacle was jammed, probably 3,000 to 3,500 persons standing. At this meeting he attacked the "isms and schisms," including Christian Science, "Millenium Dawnism" and other cults.

### FULL VINDICATION

### OF RECIPROCITY

Wisdom of the Liberal Policy is Conclusively Demonstrated by Government's Free Wheat Order.

(Ottawa Citizen.)

A more complete vindication of the Liberal reciprocity platform of 1911 than is afforded by the belated action of the Federal administration in granting free wheat, is impossible to conceive. The western grain growers, who in 1910 came to Ottawa to present their case to the government of the day, made free wheat their rallying cry. It was the conclusive demonstration of the necessity of this reform that led Sir Wilfrid Laurier to risk his political life on a platform of reciprocity in natural products in the general elections of 1911. But the privileged interests were too strong and the campaign degenerated into a delirious saturnalia of alleged patriotism, to the complete subordination of the issue. The government was defeated and was replaced by a cabinet from which, although lacking in firm leadership, much was hoped for.

During the last six years the people of Canada, and particularly those of the west, have had ample opportunity to reflect upon the folly of 1911 and its consequences. The necessities of war time have aided in making clear the soundness of the proposed reciprocity policy of the Liberals, and in no department has this been more apparent than in the original main contention that free wheat was essential to the prosperity of the grain growing districts and to the whole of the Dominion. Today the flag-wavers and vocal patriots of six years ago stand abashed, exposed by the inexorable logic of sound economics. But can the administration stop here? Can it admit that the people may get too much of a good thing? Will it assert that free wheat is beneficial or likely to be, but that free oats, barley, flax, potatoes and free agricultural machinery will hurt the Canadian farmer? Or will the government candidly avow its errors and come out manfully and squarely for the Liberal platform of 1911? The late government is largely in its own hands. The time is short and deathbed repentances are of doubtful value.

This will be the first session of the

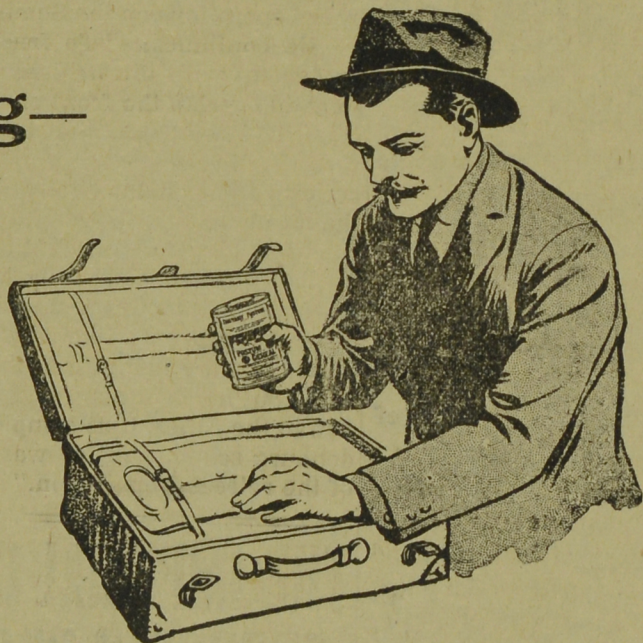
Austria nparliament since the outbreak of the war.
