

of Canada, and particularly those of the west, have had ample opportunity to reflect upon the folly of 1911 and its consequences. The necessities of war time have aided in making clear he soundness of the proposed reciprocity policy of the Liberals, and in no department has this been more apparent than in the original main contention that free wheat was essential to the prosperity of the grain growing districts and to the whole of the Dominion. Today the flag-wavers and vocal patriots of six years ago stand abashed, exposed by the inexorable ogic of sound economics. But can the administration stop here? Can it admit that the people may get too much of a good thing? Will it assert that free wheat is beneficial or likely to be, but that free oats, barley, flax, potatoes and free agricultural machinery will hurt the Canadian farmer? Or will the government candidly avow its errors and come out manfully and squarely for the Liberal platform of 1911? The late government is largely in its own hands. The time is short and deathbed repentances are of doubt ful value.
