LARGE MILITARY CAMPS NOT TO BE OCCUPIED THIS YEAR

Troops Now in Training Will be Sent Overseas Without Delay to Fill up Gaps ---Hon. G. P. Graham Brands as a Falsehood a Statement Made by Mr. R. B. Bennett.

Ottawa, April 26.—For the first time since the war started, the large military camps of Canada will be practically unoccupied by overseas troops this summer. It is understood that the Valcartier camp, which housed the first contingent, will not be occupied at all, as all the troops from the Quebec and Montreal districts will have left for overseas. There will be a camp at Niagara, at Petawawa and possibly Camp Hughes, and it is not yet determined what use will be made of Camp Borden.

The large casualty list coming in daily has resulted in the troops of the Fifth Division being sent over to France, and the troops now in Canada will be rushed over to fill up the gaps so that the Fifth Division may proceed to the front as a complete organization.

Hon. Mr. Graham Protests.

Hon. Geo. P. Graham took occasion at the opening of the House to unequivocally brand as a falsehood the statement made by R. B. Bennett last night to the effect that the late Minister of Railways had agreed to hand over the Intercolonial Railway to the Canadian Northern interests if the Liberal government was sustained in the 1911 elections.

Mr. Graham produced telegrams from Sir Donald Mann and Sir William Mackenzie unequivocally denying Mr. Bennett's charge, and he added that there was no understanding or undertaking of any kind made with him or with the government to the taking over of the Intercolonial by Messrs. Mac-

kenzie & Mann.

Mr. Bennett made a somewhat lame excuse, declaring that ex-Finance Minister Fielding had set a capital value upon the Intercolonial upon which a "leasal" value might have been figured. That was all the basis he had on which to base a sensational and unfounded charge.

Hon. Charles Murphy was told that the salary paid by the Ontario government to S. A. Armstrong, assistant provincial secretary, was not continued while he was serving as director of the military hospitals commission. Mr. Armstrong is receiving from the hospitals commission a salary of \$7,500 a year.

Enough Farm Laborers.

According to a return tabled in the Commons relative to the efforts of the Interior Department to secure farm laborers from the United States for the Canadian west, the propaganda to secure laborers from across the line has now been stopped. The department states that the Alberta and Saskatchewan governments announce that they have already sufficient help and the requirements of Manitoba also appear to be fairly well filled.

Copies of the advertisements printed in United States newspapers, it is interesting to note, emphasize the fact, under the signature of the Hon. Dr. Roche, that "while the government has the power to enforce conscription such action has not been considered either advisable or necessary, and that even were conscription introduced, it would apply to Canadian citizens only."

SOLDIER KILLS WIFE AND THEN SUICIDES

**Double Tragedy Shocks Halifax---
Jealousy the Motive for Double
Crime.**

Halifax, April 26.—At 12.30 yesterday afternoon the bodies of Sergeant Fred Leach and his wife were found lifeless in their apartments, 27 Gladstone barracks, Cogswell street. The bodies lay on a bed. The woman was fully dressed with her street clothes, including gloves, and her hat was on a near by table. A confession of the "double crime" was in the pocket of the man's tunic.

The discovery was made by men who, the evening previous, had received instructions from Sergt. Leach to come to his apartment and take back a piano, as he was about to break up housekeeping. He had rented the piano from a piano company in the city some time ago.

There was much blood around the bodies and at first it was thought that the throats of both victims had been cut. When Undertaker Spencer took charge of the bodies he found that the man's throat had been cut, and there were no cuts on the woman, who evidently had been strangled to death with a cotton scarf, which was around her neck. Her face was discolored and this gave the impression that she had been struck and bruised, but later it was decided the discoloration came from the strangling and the fact that the body had lain on its face for at least twelve hours.

The bodies were taken to Spencer's undertaking parlors and last evening the medical examiner gave the verdict that the woman had been murdered by her husband, who had then taken his own life while temporarily insane.

In the possession of the medical examiner is a written confession which was found in Sergt. Leach's tunic. The writing of the confession is somewhat formal. It commences: "I, Fred Leach" and goes on to recite the reasons he had for being about to commit a "double crime." The name of another military man is mentioned in the confession, and the document goes into extensive and unpublizable details regarding the relations of this man with Mrs. Leach.

Action re Tuberculosis.

The Board also decided to enforce the provincial regulations concerning tuberculosis cases. Under these regulations tuberculosis is regarded as a contagious disease and dangerous to the public. Physicians discovering or suspecting the presence of cases of this disease are to report them to the Board of Health. It is not necessary to placard houses, however. The Board will supply literature on the means of combating the disease.

Inspection of Premises.

A thorough inspection of yards and premises is to be made. If Inspector McKay is unable to cover the ground himself he is empowered to engage the services of a nassistant.

All members of the Board of Health were present except Ald. F. H. Everett, who was unable to be present on account of his residence being quarantined. The Board adjourned to meet on May 10th.

Asked for Exhibition Grant.

A delegation of about fifteen members representing the Fredericton Board of Trade and Agricultural Society No. 24, went before the Provincial Government yesterday afternoon and asked that the usual grant be given on the Fredericton Exhibition of 1917. The spokesmen were President John A. Campbell, Vice-President Chas. H. Thomas, and Secretary W. S. Hooper, of the Agricultural Society.
