

GREAT VOGUE FOR STRIPES
IN COSTUMES THIS SPRINGNot Becoming to All—Stripes Around
Only Suited to Youthful and Slender Figures.

There is a great vogue for stripes this spring. The most important question about stripes is whether or not they are becoming. Many of the new frocks show the fabric cut so that the stripes go around the figure. Obviously this style, though smart, is only suited to the slender and youthful woman or young girl.

The very fine stripe is becoming to almost any figure—cut as stripes are normally cut, so that it runs up and down. Wide stripes, even when they run up and down, must be chosen with care, as they are always conspicuous.

Must be Well Cut.

It takes a certain amount of deftness to cut striped fabrics properly. For that reason the novice at dress-making can do better with a very narrow stripe than with a wide one. In ready made frocks of good quality you will notice that the stripes usually

match at the skirt seams. To make this possible is no easy task for the amateur.

In the skirts of this year the front edge of the back gore of the skirt is usually cut on a straight line. So what you must do to get the right effect is to put added fullness in the top of the front gore so its sides will likewise be straight. Again the back gore will show matching stripes on the bias.

How to Fold.

When you are cutting striped material, fold it either lengthwise or crosswise, and then very carefully pin it a intervals, so that the stripes of the two thicknesses are directly in line with each other. If you do this carefully, the bias back seam—the back section of course will be cut double—is bound to match, and you have nothing to worry about except that you must sew up the seam carefully so that neither piece of the fabric has any chance to slip.

Always be sure that the stripes balance! That is, cut the back of the blouse or the front of the skirt on a fold made either in the centre of the stripe or exactly between the two stripes.

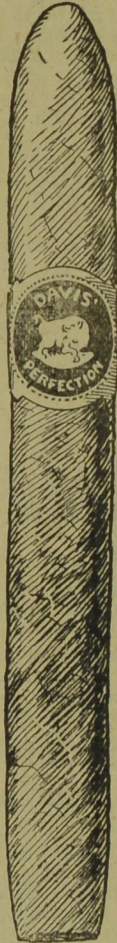

TENER PREDICTS

GREAT BASEBALL YEAR
IN SPITE OF WAR

Huge Crowds Attending Games in West
---Eastern Attendance Not Far Behind---President Optimistic.

New York, April 24.—President Tener has brought back glowing accounts of the National League games in the west. He declared that the attendance figures in Cincinnati, St. Louis and Pittsburgh were much greater than a year ago at this time.

The Governor attended the opening of the season in Cincinnati, and saw more than 25,000 fans rooting their heads off for Christy Mathewson's Reds. Then he went to St. Louis to witness the start of the Cardinals.

More than 16,000 persons passed through the turnstiles. The Governor of Missouri pitched the first ball from the box and the Mayor of St. Louis caught it behind the plate. Another large crowd saw the Pirates begin proceedings at Forbes Field, while the patronage of the Cubs in Chicago so far has exceeded Owner Weeghman's fondest hopes.

The fact that 27,000 fans saw the Giants shut out the Braves here on Saturday, coupled with the revival of interest in the West, seems to indicate that the Governor recently spoke by the card when he predicted a prosperous baseball year for the majors and minors.

IN BIG LEAGUE BUNCH

For five years the New York manager has nursed the famous redskin along, hoping that he would develop into a player of championship calibre, but he has at last given up the job and has allowed Thorpe to go to Mathewson's Cincinnati club for the waiver price, \$2,500. He will replace Roush on the Red's line-up. The latter was badly injured, sliding into a base the other day.

Thorpe won great fame as a Carlisle athlete, and his crowning achievement was the winning of the all-round championship at Stockholm in 1912. By admitting having played professional baseball before his trip to Stockholm the Indian was shorn of his laurels and gave back the prizes. As a baseball player he has not lived up to expectations.

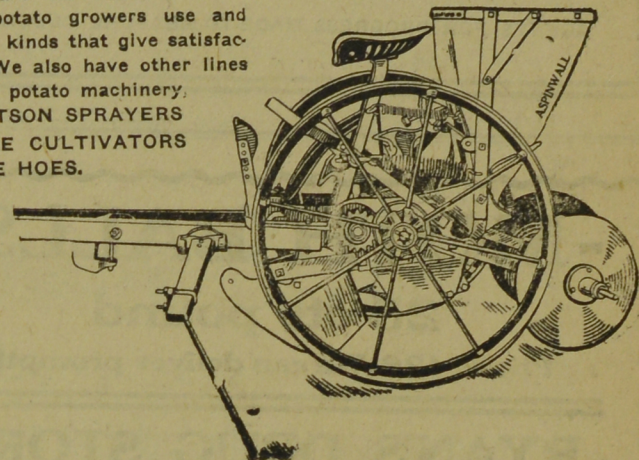
