## MR. C. M. LEGER IS DEPUTY SPEAKER OF LEGISLATURE

Popular Member for Westmorland Will Preside Over Committee on Ways and Means--Mr. Baxter Does Not Want to Be Called "Doctor"---More Notices of Enquiry From Both Sides.

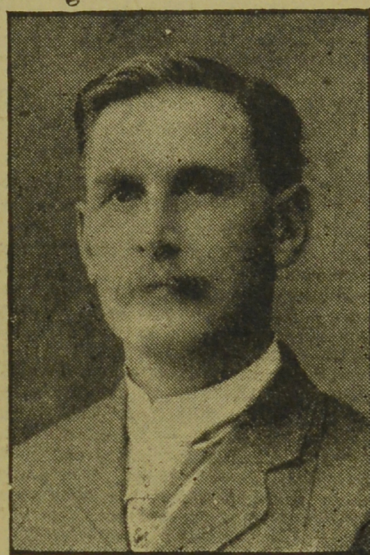
The House opened at 3 p.m. on Wednesday.

Mr. Baxter said he wished to make a slight correction in the Journals. He noticed that he was referred to as "Dr." Baxter. That practice, he believed, was incorrect, as only persons possessing titles conferred by His Majesty were entitled to be addressed by them under parliamentary practice.

Persons holding purely academical degrees were not entitled to be addressed as such under the practice adopted by most parliamentary bodies.

Mr. Burchill submitted the report of the committee on standing rules.

Hon. Mr. Byrne said that his attention had been called to a bill from St. John which appeared to him to be three separate bills run into one. That was something the House should not consent to, as it was departing from a principle which had been observed by the House in the past.

## HON. HENRY D. YERXA GIVES USUAL DONATION

Douglas Man, Successful in Boston, Remembers Victoria Hospital--His Comment on the War.

The H. C. L. is felt as practically in the management of Victoria Public Hospital as in the home where everybody is healthy and in possession of a good appetite. It is the intention of the trustees to try and reduce the cost of potatoes and vegetable generally by assisting in the greater production movement, and will cultivate a portion of the ground surrounding the hospital.

One of the most faithful and generous benefactors of the hospital is Hon. Henry D. Yerxa, a Boston merchant prince, and a native of Douglas, York county. In closing last year's accounts, Secretary-Treasurer Sampson was unable to place Mr. Yerxa's annual grant of two hundred dollars in its customary position, and the cause of this omission is patriotically explained in a letter to his nephew, Mr. Elijah B. Yerxa of this city, in which he writes:

I am enclosing cheque for \$200 for the Victoria Hospital. I cannot find that I paid this money last year; I usually have sent it in October. I remember having it in mind that I must get it down there promptly, as probably the hospital needed it more than usual. I am rather chagrined that I should have overlooked it. You will kindly explain this to the Secretary-Treasurer.

This cheque applies on last year; it will probably, have to go into this year's funds, but I am giving it on account of what I should have given last year. I shall hope to be able to give it again this year, but at the present time there is no surety of what any of us may be able to do. We are in the war now, and as to the affect it will have on business, I am not able to determine. I take pleasure in sending this money, and if circumstances are such that I am able to continue, I shall certainly do so.

I want to assure you that I am proud of the Canadian soldiers, and feel much interested in the young men who have gone from our part of the country (Douglas) to the front.

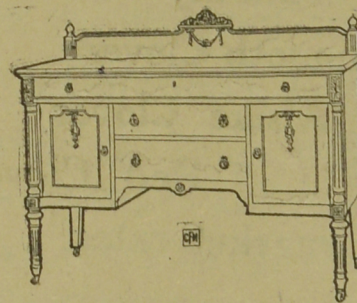
New Ladder Truck Out.
