The Pacing Futurity for 3-year-old pacers, \$2,000.

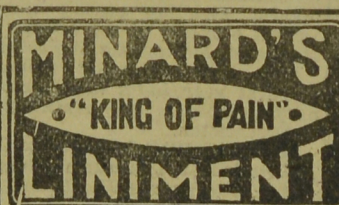
