CHRIST**OF INTEREST TO WOMEN.****IT'S TIME TO PICKLE.**Although pickles are not nourishing,
they surely do add zest to meat. Here
are some good recipes for pickles that
will help fill up your supply shelves:
Mustard Pickles.Have ready a quart of large cucum-
bers and a quart of small cucumbers,
a quart of small onions, two heads of
cauliflower and two green peppers. Put
these into a weak brine in separate
receptacles. Let them stand for 24
hours, then scald them in vinegar sepa-
rately and boil them until tender.While boiling prepare a paste as
follows: Mix six tablespoonfuls of
mustard with one of tumeric, one cup-
ful and a half of sugar and a cupful of
flour. Moisten to a paste with a little
vinegar and gradually continue to add
vinegar until two quarts have been
used or enough to make a thin sauce.
Stir carefully and constantly while it
is cooking to prevent lumps from
forming. Cook the vegetables in this
sauce until they are well coated with
it. Then set away in a cold cellar in
small stone or glass jars. If well cov-
ered with the sauce they do not have
to be sealed tight.**Sweet Cucumber Pickles.**Peel large green cucumbers and re-
move the seeds. Cut into inch-long
pieces, and place in a big bowl or
crock. Sprinkle thickly with salt. In
the morning, drain thoroughly and
weigh. For every seven pounds add
three and a half pounds of sugar, a cup
full of vinegar and three-quarters of a
cup of whole cloves, allspice and broken
cinnamon stick.**Ripe Cucumber Pickles.**Remove skins and seeds from five
pounds of ripe cucumbers and pack in
strong brine to stand overnight. In
the morning drain and place in a pre-
serving kettle, with two quarts of ci-
der vinegar, not too strong. Add cin-
namon, ground cloves and allspice, a
teaspoon of each, three pounds of
brown sugar and three chopped red

ACT**The policy of the
Dominion Alliance is to
encourage the repeal of
the Canada Temperance
Act (Scott Act) in
counties in which it has
been operating. Where
this is done the new
Provincial Prohibitory
Law would then become
effective.It is always easier to
enforce one uniform
law. The New Brun-
swick Government can-
not put its new law in
effect in Scott Act
counties, as the latter is
Dominion legislation,
which has precedence
over provincial legisla-
tion. Friends of tem-
perance who live in
Scott Act counties are,
however, asked to co-
operate in the more
thorough enforcement
of that Act so long as it
continues in operation.Do you realize that every province in Canada, except British Columbia
and Quebec, are now actually enjoying Prohibition! And Prohibition is
winning too in Quebec; 976 municipalities in Quebec are "dry" and
only 182 "wet"! What a glorious heritage! But the day is not far off
when the great test must come. Shall Prohibition laws remain perma-
nently on the law books—or only for "duration of the war"?The answer depends upon the use we make of the weapon of pro-
hibitory law while it is in our grasp. Upon the shoulders of every man and
woman in this province (who wants to see the curse abolished forever) lies
a heavy burden of responsibility! Prohibition *must be enforced* and the
trenches held, not by a few zealous officers of the law alone—but by
*the whole people!***Help to Enforce Prohibition**Since September 16, 1916, Ontario has enjoyed good enforcement of
Prohibition in all but a few districts. Not the most daring anti-prohibi-
tionist harbors the slightest hope for a return to the curse of the traffic in
Ontario. Here are some figures showing results in Ontario's largest cities
for the last three months of 1915 and 1916:
