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GERMAN ACCOUNT OF REVOLUTION IN RUSSIA

Berlin, March 15 (wireless to the A. P. via Sayville).—There has been a successful revolution in Russia, according to the Overseas News Agency (the official German news bureau), which today gave out the following statement:

The following official report was issued in Petrograd on March 14 about the successful Russian revolution.

The population of Petrograd, incensed by the complete disorganization of transport services and of a gradual elimination of trade, had been irritated for a long time against the government responsible for all its sufferings. The government, expecting some trouble, took measures on a large scale in order to maintain order, and am-

ing other things ordered dissolution of the council of the empire and the Duma.

The Duma, however, on March 11th decided not to accept the Imperial ukase, but to continue its meetings. It immediately instituted an executive committee presided over by M. Rodzianko, president of the Duma. That committee declared itself to be a provisional government and issued the following appeal:

"Considering the difficulties in regard to domestic tranquility, which are due to the policy of the former government, the executive committee of the Duma feels compelled to take public order in its own hands. Fully conscious of the responsibility arising from this decision, the committee expresses the certainty that the population and the army will lend their assistance for the difficult task of creating a new government, which will accept the wishes of the people and enjoy their confidence."

The executive committee constituted itself a controlling force in the capital, which was in full revolution, and with the army completely united with the revolutionists, it arrested all the ministers and sent them to jail. The Duma declared that the ministerial cabinet no longer existed.

Today, on the third day of the revolution, the capital, where order is returning swiftly, is completely in the hands of the executive committee of the Duma and of the troops which garrisoned Petrograd, and numbering 30,000, they support the revolution.

Deputy Engelpard, colonel of the general staff, has been appointed commander of Petrograd by the committee.

Yesterday the committee issued proclamations to the population, to the troops, railroads and banks, asking them to resume their usual activities. Deputy Gronska was chosen by the Duma committee for provisional engagement of the Petrograd Telegraphic Agency. This probably refers to the semi-official Russian news agency.

BRITISH SUCSES ON MAC DOVAN FRONT

Line Has Been Pushed Forward One Thousand Yards on a Wide Frontage.

London, March 15.—The British line southwest of Doiran, on the Macedonian front, has been advanced 1,000 yards over a front of 3,500 yards, says a despatch received from Salonika today. The British trenches are thus brought in places to within a couple of hundred yards of the German-Bulgarian advanced lines. The operation was carried out at night and met with no opposition.

The new line, the despatch points out, possesses several advantages.

It shortens the front by straightening the salient on Horseshoe Hill, which has always been an exposed position. It also strengthens the British defences by the addition of an extra line of trenches. Furthermore, it facilitates additional raids upon the hostile positions in this sector by reducing No Man's Land to the limits of a sharp sprint.

could also buy field kitchens, tents and other gear which are now left to the enterprise of the regimental officers.

Earnestness Required.

What the government needs to provide from Ottawa, besides the necessary expenses of recruiting, is spirit and leadership—also a little earnestness. Recruiting in some of the most loyal centres—Toronto for example—has come to be such a joke that even the recruits are not to be taken in by it. A prominent military man stated the other day that it cost \$10 each to get out and get recruits and \$15 in the man's pockets to nail him down. One suspects that it costs even more than that when one sees a great theatre hired for the night, half a dozen professional singers employed and perhaps a High Court Judge to act as chairman—all to land one recruit who may be rejected for fallen arches when it comes to the show-down.

The great War Veterans' Association, spending thousands of dollars in advertising, seems to be having great difficulty in raising two hundred and fifty men in thirty days. Toronto is less loyal than of yore, but because Toronto begins to suspect that Ottawa is "kidding us along" The greatest flip recruiting could have would be a display of sincerity on the part of the Borden government. As it is, under the lash, the galled jade wince, but refuses to budge an inch.

FORMERLY WITH THE C. P. R.

Lieut. Hawkins, Killed in Action, was a Locomotive Engineer.

Lieut. Kenneth B. Hawkins, whose death in action was mentioned in the Mail this week, was a former employee of the C. P. R. He commenced work for the railroad at Aroostook Junction on May 1st, 1910, was appointed a fireman Aug. 31st, 1911, and a locomotive engineer Sept. 1st, 1914, just after war broke out.

On Dec. 18, 1914, he went into military service at the Detention Camp, at Amherst. After making repeated applications for overseas service his persistence was finally rewarded, and he sailed for England with the 24th Battalion some time in September, 1916, and was shortly afterwards sent to France, where he gave his life for his country, leaving a wife and two small children to mourn his loss.

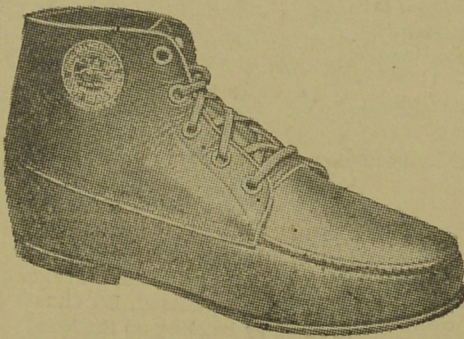

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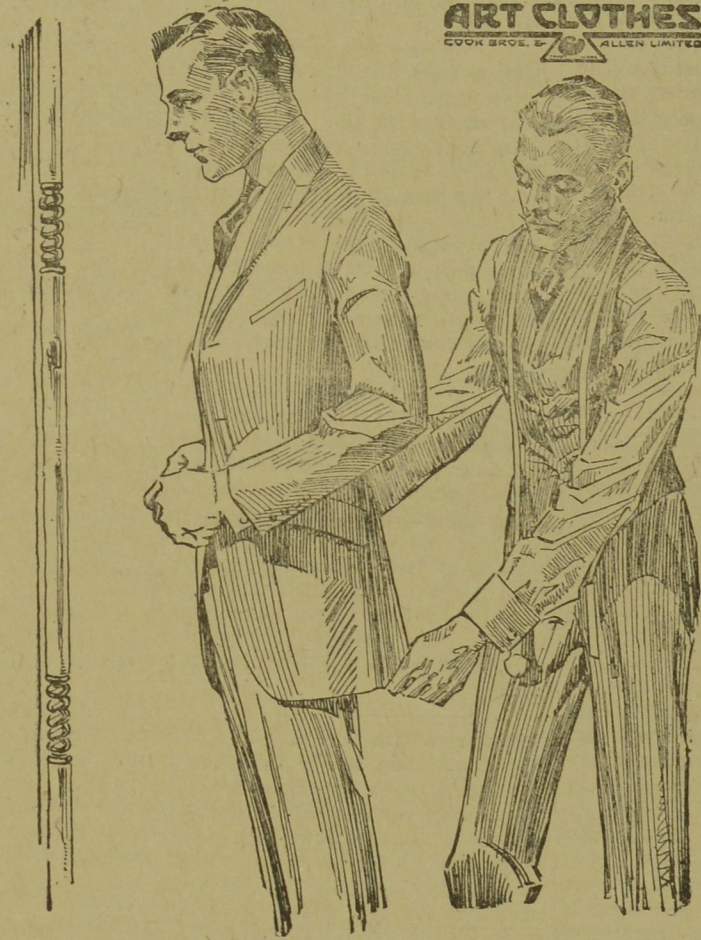
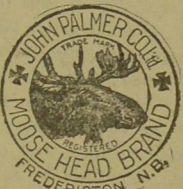
