CZAR OF ALL THE RUSSIAS ABDICATES THE THRONE

Andrew Bonar Law Announces in the British House That There Has Been a Revolution---The Duma in Control of the Situation Has the Support of the Military---Little Bloodshed Reported ---The People are all for War.

London, March 15.—Andrew Bonar Law, Chancellor of the Exchequer, announced in the House of Commons tonight that Emperor Nicholas of Russia had abdicated and that Grand Duke Michael Alexandrovitch had been appointed regent. The soldiers sided with the Duma in the recent revolution, but there was no serious loss of life.

The Chancellor added that it was comforting to know that the movement was not directed at securing peace by Russia, the committee in charge affirming their determination to carry the war to a successful conclusion.

"Only tonight," the Chancellor of the Exchequer said, "a message has been received from our ambassador to the effect that a statement from the Duma announced that the Emperor had abdicated and that Grand Duke Michael Alexandrovitch has been appointed regent.

"There is some comfort for us in the comparative tranquillity with which the change was conducted. The movement was not in any sense directed toward an effort to secure peace by Russia. On the contrary, the discontent was not against the government for carrying on the war, but for not carrying it on with that efficiency and energy which the people had expected."

Army Must be Maintained.

London, March 15.—"The military committee of the Duma, says Reuter's Petrograd correspondent, "has asked all the officers not yet employed by the committee to undertake the organization of the soldiers who joined the people, and help guard the capital. The committee pointed out that at the present moment, when facing an enemy who wishes to take advantage of the temporary weakness of the country, it was absolutely necessary to make all possible effort to maintain the power of the army."

"The president of the Duma sent

telegrams to the commanders of the Baltic and Black Sea fleets, and to the chiefs of the armies in the field, requesting that the army and navy preserve absolute calm and be sure that the struggle against the foreign enemy was not suspended or weakened even for a single moment."

An imperial body-guard regiment rode into Petrograd. It is estimated that there are now sixty thousand troops in the capital. The political prisoners in the Schlusselburg have been released."

The News in England.

London, March 15.—The news that "Great Russia" had joined the democracies of the world, and that one of the three great absolutist rulers of the world had resigned his throne, in accordance with the demands of his people, was received here with unmixed joy. There has been no illusion about Russia here. Particularly in the last year it had been well understood that the situation there has been the people against the throne.

"The people and the army are all for the war and against Germany," has been the word from Russia repeatedly. That the court has been enshrouded in a pro-German atmosphere and that the Emperor was a weak man under the thumb of his wife and under the domination of members of the bureaucracy influenced only by traditions of the old bureaucracy and some in the pay of German diplomats, also had been reported.

The men now in control of the destinies of the great empire of western Europe are Russians who are anti-German to the core, so the Russian developments are regarded here as wholly to the benefit of the Entente powers in the war.

Empress Under Guard.

London, March 16.—A Petrograd despatch to the Daily Chronicle dated Wednesday, says the Empress of Russia has been placed under guard.

MEANEST THIEVES FOUND IN VICINITY OF PENNIAC

Chickens Stolen From Wife of Soldier Who is Serving With Canadian Expeditionary Force.

The meanest thief or thieves in the county of York have been at work in the vicinity of Penniac. On Monday night Mrs. John R. Barter's premises were visited and seventeen chickens stolen. Mrs. Barter was absent at an entertainment being held for patriotic purposes. Her husband, who is well known in Fredericton, is absent on active service with the Canadian Expeditionary Force. The owner of the chickens is in such a position that the loss of the birds is keenly felt.

The people of Penniac are very indignant on account of the incident, and are willing to offer a reward for the apprehension of the thief or thieves. The worst feature, in their minds, is that Mrs. Barter's husband is serving in the army, while those suspected of the theft are young men of military age who have shown no inclination to enlist.

Hostile Airplane Over Westgate

London, March 16.—The War Office announced that at 5.30 today a hostile airplane dropped bombs at Westgate. There were no casualties and the material damage was reported slight.

Westgate is a watering place close to Margate and about eighty miles from London.

MILLARD F. REID'S HOUSE BURNED DOWN LAST NIGHT

Anglican Church and Neighboring Residences Had Narrow Escape--Thought Fire Caught From Stove

The handsome residence of Mr. Millard F. Reid, of Marysville, with barn and outbuildings, was totally destroyed by fire last night. It is thought the fire started about midnight. Mr. Reid was away from home at the time. Everything on the premises was burned, and it took a hard fight to save the homes of Messrs. Duncan Reid and Geo. Dayton, while All Saints' Anglican Church also had a very narrow escape from destruction. Only by the brave and hard labors of the fire fighters were the other buildings saved. The shingles and clapboards of Mr. Duncan Reid's house were badly burned.

Mr. Millard Reid informed the Mail this morning that he did not save as much as an overcoat.

Both building and furniture were insured in companies represented by Mr. M. Brewer.

There was no fire in the furnace, and Mr. Reid thinks it caught from the kitchen stove.

SCHOOL BOARD'S ACTION CONDEMNED BY PUBLIC

Public comment upon the recent award of the contract for the Charlotte Street School extension to a St. John contractor is strongly against the action of the School Board in turning down a local contractor when his figure was only a few dollars above that of the outsider. It is said that the policy of favoring local industry seems to apply only in certain lines of business.

The figure of Mr. R. A. Corbett, to whom the contract was given, was \$17,400. That of Mayor Mitchell was \$17,434. The difference was only one-fifth of one per cent., and it is the general opinion that the local man should
