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## GENERAL TURNER SAYS THAT DRAFTS ARE BADLY NEEDED

**Writes an Appreciative Letter to Minister of Militia---Canadian Troops Engaged in a Bitter Struggle---Sir Wilfrid Not to go Farther West Than Winnipeg--No Itinerary Mapped Out for Ontario.**

London, Nov. 28. — General Mewburn, the Minister of Militia of Canada, having cabled that he had no time for electioneering, because he felt his supreme duty was getting 20,000 men overseas, General Turner, V. C., commander of the Canadian forces in England, has replied:

"I cannot express to you the deep appreciation of all ranks overseas for your statement that you are working day and night to secure us 20,000 reinforcements, beginning this year. We know only too well over here that the Fifth Division will indeed be wiped off the slate in order to reinforce the divisions in France, if large, fresh drafts are not immediately forthcoming. We, who are close to the fighting zone, know only too well the bitter struggle which the Canadian divisions are making to maintain their position. If the people of Canada would only realize that in order to maintain our divisions at full strength, men who have been wounded having been rushed back as soon as they are fit, without the leave or rest to which they are entitled, I believe there is not a patriotic citizen in Canada who would not stand heart and soul behind you in your endeavors. Sir Robert Borden has given his pledge that he will not betray us and we know we may rely on him to the utmost. We are relying, too, on the honor of our countrymen in Canada to be true to themselves and to us in the great crisis."

Ottawa, Nov. 28. — Sir Wilfrid

Laurier is booked to speak in Winnipeg on Monday, December 10, and will probably leave Ottawa on Friday or Saturday night, though the exact date of departure will depend on the engagements he may have between the present and that time.

Sir Wilfrid has been strongly urged to go as far as Vancouver but it is very improbable that he will go farther than Winnipeg.

It is likely that he will address a meeting or two in Ontario in the interval though there is little likelihood of his going to Toronto. Last night's meeting in Ottawa evidently taxed his strength to the utmost and the exertion of speaking plus train travel is probably more than he is equal to with any degree of frequency. So far no itinerary has been mapped out for Ontario.

Hartley H. Dewar, M.P.P., will accompany Sir Wilfrid to Winnipeg. Other lieutenants from the west will join him at Winnipeg.

Returned Soldiers Guard Borden. Simcoe, Ont., Nov. 28. — Escorted by a bodyguard of returned soldiers, Sir Robert Borden, who was accompanied by Hon. N. W. Rowell and Hon. William Charlton, the former Liberal speaker of the legislature and present Unionist candidate for Norfolk, was greeted when he entered the armories this afternoon by over 2,000 men and women rising to their feet and cheering. Many were turned away. The chair was occupied by Thomas Ager, the ministerial association of the two were present as a body to support the Union government and Rev. C. J. Day offered up a prayer for the Empire, for the Allies and that the purpose of the premier to sustain Canada's army might be upheld by the people.

"If there was ever a day when Canadians should be united in a common purpose in order that Canada shall not die, that time is now," declared Hon. William Charlton. "We all hoped that the best might prevail but it might not unless we support those struggling for use in the smoke of battle."

There had been no referendum in 1904, he said. When Sir Wilfrid Laurier amended the militia act, which recognized the principle of conscription, he said, the law was passed.

The principal objection of the farmers was that their sons were being taken but it was not the intention of the act to take farm labor when it might be more useful on the farm than in the army. In Norfolk there had been 438 applications for exemption and only 65 had been refused.

Ex-Mayor Oliver of Toronto, spoke briefly. "Are we going to forsake the men at the front?" he asked. "That's all there is to it." The audience shouted "No."

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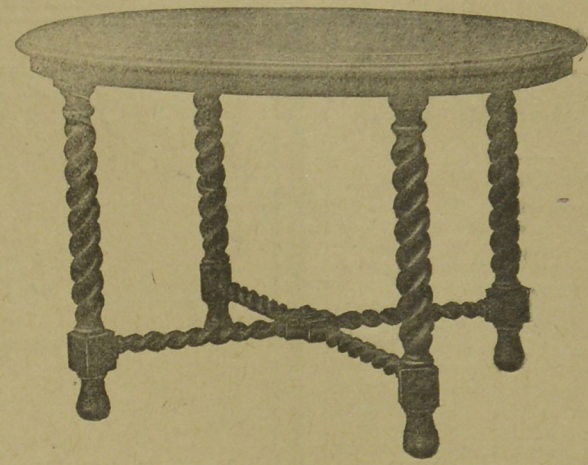

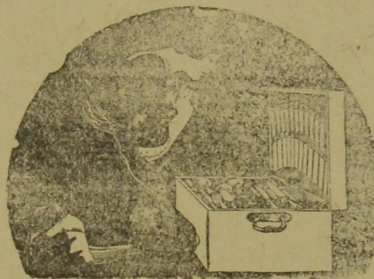
Late Mrs. Prudence J. Carr.
