MUCH INTEREST AT OTTAWA IN CONSCRIPTION DEBATE

One of the Most Momentous Issues Discussed in Parliament--The Galleries Crowded With Spectators --Conservative M. P's Leave Their Party.

Ottawa, July 5. — Canada's parliament is on the eve of voting to pass the conscription bill. Shortly after daylight it is anticipated that it will declare by a substantial non-partisan majority for the government's measure. It will record his decision in the face of national considerations of great gravity and after a momentous fifteen days of debate in which party lines have been broken to an extent unequalled since Confederation.

Late in the afternoon spectators began to fill the public galleries. By night they were crowded. There was intense interest. Members and senators were in their places. One member, J. P. O. Guilbault of Joliette, who has been ill for some months, was wheeled in on a moving chair. Most of the representatives seemed impressed with the seriousness of their position. As the debate draws to a close and the time for voting comes near parliament is again assuming the serious mien with which it inaugurated the consideration of the momentous issue. There is no humor, no laughter, no clever quips. There is comparatively little applause. The crowded chamber and the onlooking people in the galleries are silent and solemn.

Still in Debate at Midnight.
At midnight the house was still in debate. There are increasing signs of natural restlessness. The premier, Sir Robert Borden, had fitted in and out of the chamber all evening, rarely remaining more than a few moments at a time. The veteran leader of the opposition, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, was in his place almost continuously, following every phase of the debate with remarkable alertness. The members

generally held their seats and occasionally greeted the expression of sentiments which they approved with momentary desk-tapping.

Many Liberals who have announced their intention of voting for the referendum have also stated that, in event of its defeat, they will declare for a second reading of the bill. This should carry by a majority close to sixty.

Among the "strangers" who arrived tonight are Sir Edmond Osler, Toronto, who makes his first appearance in parliament for three sessions, and Sir Rodolphe Forget, Montreal, who has also been a consistent absentee.

Quebec Members Desert.

Two members from the government side left their ranks and took seats behind Sir Wilfrid Laurier when the house resumed this afternoon. These were Messrs. Achim and Mondou, both of whom had previously announced their intention of joining the Liberal party as a protest against the military service bill.

They were received with Liberal cheers, which were renewed when Mr. Mondou rose and spoke to a point of privilege with regard to the report of his speech which appeared in today's Gazette and also in the Ottawa Citizen. His objection was that in these reports at the conclusion of his speech in the translation of his eulogy of Sir Wilfrid Laurier when he had also spoken of the work of the Liberal party, the latter had been omitted. To correct this he read the report and then the French Hansard report of his speech.

Mr. LaFortune of Montcalm, spoke strongly against the bill and was followed by Hon. J. C. Doherty in support of it.

INDEMNITY IS DEMANDED BY ARGENTINA

London, July 6.—According to a despatch from Buenos Ayres to the Times, the Argentine government has demanded an immediate apology and indemnity from Germany for the torpedoing of the Argentine vessels, Oriana and Toro, and a guarantee that the Argentine flag will be respected in the future.

A despatch from Buenos Ayres last Sunday said that the Argentine government was determined to enter a claim against Germany for the sinking of these vessels, and that a note embodying the demands was sent to Germany the day before.

WESTERN LIBERALS TO CONVENE

Ottawa, July 5. — Official announcement of the calling of a Liberal convention for the four provinces west of the Great Lakes to convene in Winnipeg on August 7 and 8 was made tonight.

The text of the announcement given out was as follows:

"The parliamentary contingent of western Liberals met here today and decided to call a convention of the Liberals of western Canada to be held in Winnipeg on August 7 and 8 next. There was a full attendance of members and senators from the prairie provinces, while British Columbia was represented by Senator Bostock, leader of the Liberal party in the senate.

"The object of the convention is to consider the whole political situation, particularly as it affects western Canada interests. It was felt at the meeting that the time had arrived when it was very necessary that a convention should be held at which western Liberals could consider what their attitude should be toward a number of serious economic and political problems arising out of conditions created by the war. The time of the convention was fixed for the latest date possible before harvest.

"The unit of representation decided upon is the provincial constituency. Each such constituency in the western provinces will be empowered to send four representatives. It is expected that many of the delegates will be women. In addition the convention membership will include all omnibus Liberal members and senators, dominant Liberal candidates and all Liberal candidates in the last provincial elections in the western provinces.

"Arrangements will be made whereby Liberals desiring to attend will be seated as visiting delegates. While plans have not been worked out it is understood that facilities will be afforded to every progressive element in western Canada to participate in the convention."

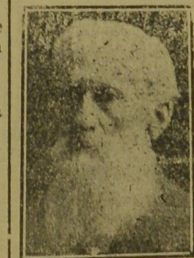

Coun. Lawson then moved that a county Canada Temperance Act inspector be appointed. The motion was defeated 11 to 10.

Grant for Children's Home.

Dr. W. C. Kierstead spoke briefly on behalf of the Children's Aid Society and asked for assistance for the home maintained by that society. A number of children from the county were inmates of that home.

On the motion of Coun. Harry Smith seconded by Coun. Sloat, a grant of \$100 was voted to the Children's Home in Fredericton. A voluntary collection among the councillors for the same institution amounted to \$35.10.



Late A. Haining, tiring from the council made brief addresses of fare-

well. They were Couns. Hunter of Manners Sutton, retiring after eight years' service; Coun. Sloat who has removed to Carleton county after representing Bright for four years, and Coun. Harry Smith who has removed to Fredericton after representing Douglas for six years.

Kind words of appreciation of the services of the retiring members were pronounced by Coun. Pat Graham and Coun. Alex. Brewer.

A vote of thanks was extended to Warden Neill who responded suitably.

A vote of thanks to Mr. J. Stewart Neill for transporting the members to the Experimental Station was passed.

The usual grants were voted to the constable, the reporters, the chaplain and the warden.

Presentation to Warden.

A most pleasing feature of the closing moments of the session was the presentation of an address and a beautiful travelling bag to Warden Neill as a token of appreciation. The presentation was made by Coun. Hunter.

The address was Warden Neill, as follows:

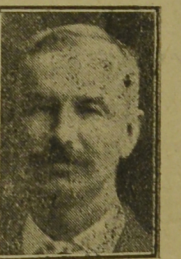
We feel that you have conscientiously and faithfully discharged the important duties of your office.
