

It is expected that many of the delegates will be women. In addition the convention membership will include alld ominion liberal members and senators, domin ion Liberal candidates and all Liberal candidates in the last provincial elections in the western provinces.

"Arrangements will be made where by Liberals desiring to attend will be seated as visiting delegates. While plans have not been worked out it is understood that facilities will be afforded to every progressive element in western Canada to participate in the convention."
