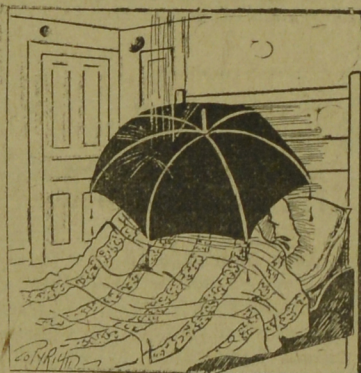

Sporting News

ZBYSZKO LOST WRESTLING TITLE TO ED. LEWIS

Pole Was Hurt Severely in the Bout—Match Lasted One Hour, 23 Minutes, and 14 Seconds.

Boston, July 5. — Ed. (Strangler) Lewis of Kentucky, is now the catch-as-catch-can wrestling champion, winning the title in 1 hour 23 minutes and 14 seconds. Before one of the largest crowds that ever watched such an event in this city he defeated the champion, Waldek Zbyszko of Poland, two falls to one at Braves Field yesterday afternoon.

When the giants went on the mat they looked to be in great shape, with the Pole the favorite. A bad accident to Zbyszko in the second session eliminated the excitement that was produced by the work of the wrestling masters in the first round.

The gameness of the Pole and the fine sportsmanship of Lewis enabled the crowd to see the pair start a third session which only lasted 45 seconds. When the Pole was carried from the mat at the end of the second session in a badly fazed condition, suffering from pain in his right elbow and leg, no one expected that he would return to the mat again. His manager, seeing his condition, did not want him to, but Zbyszko insisted. Lewis then consented to give him a longer rest than the rules allowed.

CANADIAN IS WHEELING CHAMP

Newark, N. J., July 3. — Arthur Spencer of Toronto, won the American cycle racing championship at the Velodrome yesterday. In gaining the crown the Canadian boy dethroned Frank L. Kramer, the man who has held the title for the last sixteen years.

Before Kramer the champions were: Arthur Zimmerman, Eddie Badl, "Major" Taylor and Tom Cooper, all American-born. This is the first time the American championship has passed into the hands of an outsider.

Spencer clinched the title yesterday by winning the two-mile professional race, the fifth in the championship series. By a strange coincidence Arthur was drawn to meet his brother, William Spencer, in the semi-finals. The former won handily, though Brother Bill seemingly tried to make a race of it.

In the second semi-final, Kramer was pitted against Alfred Goulet, an Australian. Goulet won, bringing him into the final with Arthur Spencer. In the supreme test the Canadian boy emerged the victor after a thrilling finish. The defeated champion clasped him by the hand, though he was ashen pale over the loss of the title.

Spencer in previous meets won the quarter-mile, one-third mile and one-half mile championship races. There remains one more titular event to be run, at five miles, but yesterday's victory gave the Canadian boy enough points to assure him of the title.

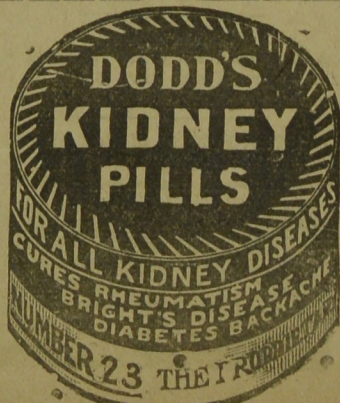
MATT BROCK PUTS K.O. ON BISHOP

M'GRAW WILL BE GIVEN CHANCE TO EXPLAIN

His Row With the Newspaper Men is Not Yet Over—Tener Reopens the Matter.

New York, July 5. — The case involving the repudiated interviews of John J. McGraw, manager of the New York National league club, and newspaper men who made the last road trip with the Giants will probably be re-opened by John K. Tener, president of the league, July 6. Although the exact date was not set, it was said McGraw would have an opportunity to offer an explanation of his part of the affair next Friday, unless some club owners found they were unable to be in New York on that date.

In discussing the request made by the New York Chapter of the Baseball Writers' Association, President Tener said that he was not only willing to re-open the case in order that the sporting writers might have an opportunity of vindicating themselves, but he would welcome a thorough investigation of McGraw's charges.

TYRUS COBB KEEPS HIS LEAD

Chicago, July 4. — Ty Cobb, keeping up his pace as leading batter in the American league, is far in the lead in total base hitting. His average is .369 and he has bagged 82 hits in 69 games for a total of 126 bases. Sixteen of his blows were doubles, eleven triples and two home runs. His batting, combined with Veach and Hellman, also, has shot Detroit to the top in team hitting with an average of .246. Speaker is hitting .345.

Roth, Cleveland, with a total of 21, maintained his pace as the leading base stealer, while Chapman, his team mate, continues to show his way to the sacrifice hitters with 33. Pipp of New York holds home run honors with six.

Hans Wagner, the Pittsburg veteran, is batting .329 as a National league regular. Roush of Cincinnati, with an average of .356, is the leader. Cruise of St. Louis, who was out in front a week ago, is a point behind Roush. Wagner made 24 hits in 18 games.

Robertson of New York held the lead in base stealing with seventeen, while Cravath of Philadelphia leads in home runs with seven. Philadelphia leads in team batting, having an average of .267.
