THE BITER BITTEN.

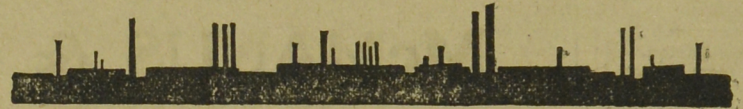
A mother took one of her children

Commission to Inquire into the Work-

Act," by which said Section Two all
companies, corporations or persons en-
gaged in manufacturing, and all em-
ployers of labor in any art or indus-
try within the Province, and all per-
sons, companies, or corporations en-
gaged in operating any public utility
in this Province, shall on or before the
first day of October next file with
the Provincial Secretary-Treasurer for
the use of the said Commission, a cer-
tified copy of the pay roll of the em-
ployees within this Province of such
person, company or corporation, and
in case any of such persons, compa-
nies or corporations has no pay roll
then a list of the employees within the

Province of such person, company or
corporation, with the wage or salary
paid to each of such employees for the
year 1916, subject in case of non-com-
pliance with the said provisions of said
Section Two to the penalties provided
by Section Three of the said Act.

PLAIN TALK IN
SAXON DIET

Copenhagen July 5—Saxon soldiers
are not fighting out of loyalty to the
King but for love of the Fatherland
and monarchical principles. Saxony is
suffering sadly from the mistakes of
an incompetent bureaucracy, and con-
ditions have reached such a state that
all parties in the Saxon parliament
are forced seriously to warn the gov-
ernment of the danger of this situa-
tion.

Such were the disagreeable declar-
ations which the government was forced
to hear from all parties except the
conservatives in a debate in the Saxon
diet yesterday, a report of which has
reached here. The discussion was on
necessary internal reforms.
