## CHRISTIAN GUARDIAN GIVES PROMINENCE TO LECTURE FAKER

Miss Lottie Tillotson's Varied Career Dealt With—Local Church Had Unpleasant Experience With Lady in Question—In Trouble in Ontario.

The following from the Christian Guardian relates to a woman who visited New Brunswick half a dozen years ago and with whom a church in Fredericton had an interesting experience: "For some years a Miss Lottie Tillotson has been visiting our Canadian churches and lecturing in them under circumstances which aroused considerable suspicion. She would write, say, the ladies' aid of a church and make an arrangement to lecture in the church at some time in the future for half the proceeds, the church to provide for her entertainment. Then, possibly two years afterward, the ladies' aid would receive news that Miss Tillotson would lecture for them on a certain evening. It sometimes happened that the aid by this time did not want her services, and told her so, but they were promptly informed that the agreement which they had foolishly signed was a cast iron affair and the lecturer was coming. And she did come. And when she came the church, of course, had to do some advertising, and when the lecturer appeared on the platform there was usually a most mortified ladies' aid to witness the performance. And when the distribution of the proceeds came to be attended to Miss Tillotson was on hand with an eye for the pennies which would have done credit to a Shylock, and a command of vituperation which would have put to shame the proverbial fishwife. The outcome was in practically every case the local church learned a lesson in regard to engaging strange lecturers which it remembered for years. But there are a great many churches in Canada, and Miss Lottie has been on the job now, we think, for over ten years.

"But the end has come at last. She was to have lectured in one of the leading churches in Sault Ste. Marie last week, but when she arrived to deliver the lecture Immigration Inspector Reynolds, of Ottawa, was on hand, and he conducted Miss Tillotson before the police magistrate, where she pleaded guilty to the charge which he laid against her, and was sentenced to pay \$50 and costs or spend three months in jail. She preferred to pay the fine and then she was escorted to the border and returned to Uncle Sam's domains, where she rightfully belongs.

"And now it transpires that this same Miss Lottie Tillotson, under the name of Mary McLean, was, on Sept. 4, 1913, sentenced to six months for shoplifting. And in the same year, in the city of Hamilton, under the name of Melba Costella, she was given a suspended sentence for a similar offence. And we recall that some time ago someone purporting to be Miss Lottie's married sister in the United States, wrote to a party in Canada asking for information as to Miss Tillotson's whereabouts, as she had not heard from her for some months. We presume that that was the time Miss Tillotson was being boarded at the expense of the state for six months.

"It must be an exceedingly mortifying thing for any church to recall that it had such a woman lecturing to its people, and we would like to give this unfortunate incident the widest circulation in order to prevent its recurrence. No church should enter into any engagement with any lecturer or entertainer without authoritative information as to the character of the man or woman who seeks its patron-

## AMERICANS WERE SHABBIY TREATED

A Party of Yarrowdale Prisoners Arrive at Copenhagen.

Copenhagen, March 2 (via London).—Four Americans from the steamer Yarrowdale, who have been prisoners in Germany for three months, arrived here today. They are Dr. John Davis, of Columbus, Miss.; Orville McKim, of Watertown, N. Y.; Dr. H. D. Snyder, of Norfolk, Va.; Richard Zabriskie, of Englewood, N. J. The four men were practically destitute.

They reached here with only the clothes they stood in, and will, under the custom of the sea, be supported by the British consul until it is possible to send them home. They owe their release before the remainder of the Americans who were on the Yarrowdale to the fact that, as physicians or veterinarians, they ranked as officers and were confined in the officers' camp at Karlsruhe. The horse tenders and sailors, who comprised the bulk of the American captives, are still held in "quarantine" at the prison camp for enlisted men at Dulken.

The four men travelled under escort to the frontier where they were put aboard a Danish ferry and left to shift for themselves. The Danish police took charge of them on their arrival in Denmark and provided railroad transportation to Copenhagen.

## AMERICAN STEAMER WARMLY GREETED

Paris, March 2.—The American freighter Rochester has been greeted at Bordeaux with the same enthusiasm as was shown in the case of the Orleans, according to a Bordeaux despatch to the Havas agency. Captain A. Korowitz, in an interview, said in regard to his trip:

"We left New York two hours after the Orleans. The voyage was not marked by any incident except for a severe storm which we ran into. I saw no submarines but thought it prudent to steam with lights out for four nights. We entered the danger zone Monday evening, but saw nothing until we reached the Gironde except one sailing ship. After all it was not so very difficult to force the blockade and arrive safely."

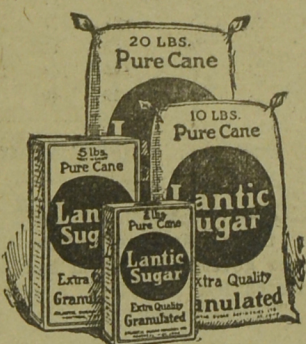
### MARMALADE without weighing

Slice six bitter oranges and seven sweet oranges and add three cups of cold water for each cup of the fruit pulp. Let stand for 24 hours in a glass or porcelain vessel, then bring slightly to the boiling point and boil for 15 minutes. Set aside for another 24 hours. Then measure five kitchen cups full of the fruit into a preserving kettle and boil briskly for about an hour. Add a 2-lb. carton of Lantic Sugar, which will need no weighing as it has been accurately weighed when it was packed.
