CANADA SHOULD BUILD MORE SHIPS

Hon. Dr. Pugsley Brings the Matter To the Attention of the Governments

Ottawa, May 14. — Before the orders for the day were called in the commons this afternoon, Hon. Dr. Pugsley again raised the question of shipbuilding in Canada. He directed attention to the statement of Sir George Foster last week, that all shipbuilding individuals or companies could secure through the Imperial Munitions Board, all the contracts with which they could cope. Dr. Pugsley asked for definite information as to how contracts could be secured, the terms upon which they were being let and the standard of vessels required.

Sir George Foster referred Dr. Pugsley to the Imperial Munitions Board for full and explicit information.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier suggested that the government should bring down all correspondence bearing on the subject.

"If there is any correspondence, it is between the imperial government and the munitions board," replied the acting premier.

"Has the government taken no interest in this matter? Has it no knowledge or nothing to do with this important question?" persisted Sir Wilfrid. Sir George Foster merely replied that the government was very busy and would be "bothered to death" if it had to be consulted on all correspondence.

Dr. Pugsley named many places on the New Brunswick coast from St. John to Gloucester where there were shipbuilding yards ready to undertake contracts, and where wooden shipbuilding had been extensively carried on in the past.

The acting premier promised to secure for Dr. Pugsley such additional information as was available.

VETERANS

Hon. Mr. Hazen's Return.

The announcement that Hon. J. D. Hazen had returned to Canada was pleasing news to the members of His Majesty's loyal opposition in the New Brunswick Legislature. Some of them have urgent business with the minister, and it would not be surprising if a delegation were to start for Ottawa this week. The governorship, a judgeship and a senatorship are among the plums which Hon. Mr. Hazen will soon be called upon to distribute, and at least six members of the opposition expect to have their party services rewarded.

WILL THE TERM BE EXTENDED?

Montreal, May 15.—An Ottawa despatch to the Star says: "With the prime minister's return the one question that looms up first is that of extension of the term of parliament."

"Sir Robert had nothing to say on this except that the extension bill would be brought in as already announced, but from other sources it is learned that the government is seriously considering extending the life of parliament whether the mass of opposition members consent to the measure or not. It is quite within the powers of the government to force an extension by means of its majority, and the whippers hereabouts today is that that is exactly what the government is about to do. A new impetus has been given to conscription by an interview given out by the Hon. Robert Rogers, in which the minister hinted at compulsion in event that the Canadian people do not come forward voluntarily with the number of men promised."

IN THE CHICAGO WHEAT MARKET

Chicago, May 15.—Sharply lower prices prevailed in the wheat market today as a consequence of the summary prohibition of new buying except to close up outstanding details. Opening prices, which ranged from 2 to 6 per cent. lower, with July at 253 to 255, and September at 235 to 226, were followed by additional setbacks of 2 to 5 cents, and then a moderate rally.

LABOR DELEGATION BEFORE GOVERNMENT

The New Brunswick Federation of Labor continued its session here this morning. A number of resolutions were passed and at noon the special legislation committee waited upon the Provincial Government and presented the resolutions dealing with provincial legislation. Consideration was promised by the executive council. At this morning's session Mr. W. Frank Hatheway, ex-M. P. of St. John, addressed the convention. Mr. Hatheway's lifelong connection with labor problems and his interest in them served to provide him with a wealth of information on the subject, and he delivered a long and very interesting address. The business of the convention is being continued this afternoon.

Last night the local labor organizations provided an entertainment for the visitors at the Labor hall. An enjoyable evening was spent.

GUTELIUS TO QUIT THE INTERCOLONIAL

Moncton, May 14. — As intimated in a Canadian Press despatch from New York, F. P. Gutelius, general manager of the C. G. R., has resigned his position and has accepted a position with the Delaware and Hudson as first vice-president, occupying practically a similar position that that held on the C. G. R. He will have charge of all departments of the D. and H. system with headquarters at Albany. Mr. Sims, whom Mr. Gutelius succeeds at Albany, goes to Montreal as general agent of the Delaware and Hudson to look after Canadian interests under Mr. Gutelius.

Mr. Gutelius came to the I. C. R. as general manager in May, 1913. Since that time the N. T. R. from Moncton to Winnipeg has been taken over, more than doubling the mileage of the system now known as the Canadian Government system of railways. During the management of Mr. Gutelius the railway has increased from \$700,000 to a million and a half per month and the number of employees practically doubled.

A DECISION FOR TEDDY

Washington, May 15.—Senate and House conferences on the army bill today agreed to report the measure with a provision authorizing the President to raise the volunteer division that Colonel Roosevelt desires to lead to France. No other changes in the bill were made by the conferees.

THE WILD CAT CROP WAS BIG

The wild cat crop in New Brunswick seems to have been better than usual during the year 1916, if we are to accept the Auditor General's report as authority. The report shows that the sum of \$905 was paid out in bounties, which means that 905 cats were deprived of their snouts and tails.

Charlotte county, as usual, was the high liner with a total of 193 cats.

York, which is also a border county, and enjoys reciprocity with the State of Maine in wild cat snouts, was second with 128. The little county of Sunbury reduced the feline population to the extent of 98.

Other counties figured in the list as follows:

SOCIALISTS DRAW LINE

London, May 15.—M. Vandervale is quoted by Reuter's Stockholm correspondent as having said in his statement to the Socialist Demokraten:

"It is impossible for us to take the hand of the German Emperor, but that does not imply disapproval of the initiative of the Dutch and Scandinavian delegates who are gathering from all sections to the international conference at Stockholm. It is to our interest to get as much light as possible thrown on the position of the socialist parties in every country, on the express understanding here that we are not thereby obliged to sit in conference with socialists who have supported and still support the imperialist policy of the Central Powers."
