**WOMEN'S INSTITUTES**  
**TO ENCOURAGE CANNING**

**Supervisor of Women's Institutes Sends**  
**Out Important Circular—The Produce**  
**Of the Garden Must be Preserved for**  
**Use Next Winter and Spring—Dept. of**  
**Agriculture will Heartily Cooperate.**

The following circular is being is-  
 sued to the Women's Institutes of the  
 Province by Miss Hazel Winter, super-  
 visor, to draw attention to the cam-  
 paign for Increased Production and the  
 part women can take in it.

"The Strength of the Empire Lies in  
 The Homes of Her People."

"New occasions teach new duties,"  
 and this war is fast bringing to a cris-  
 is a food famine unless we IMMEDI-  
 ATELY get down to the business of  
 PRODUCING MORE and SAVING  
 MORE.

That the food famine may be aver-  
 ted, we Strongly urge the women of  
 our land and especially organized so-  
 cieties like the Women's Institutes, to  
 do their "thinking caps" and do All  
 in Their Power for NATIONAL SER-  
 VICE.

The individual can do much by  
 preaching and practising, and becom-  
 ing so Enthused in this Much Needed  
 production campaign that others are  
 Bound to catch the enthusiastic germ  
 and work with such a will as to give  
 desirable results.

**Competition Invited**

The organization can lighten the  
 task and give it more cheerful aspect  
 by inviting competition and awarding  
 prizes. If the organization would a-  
 ward prizes for most attractive vege-  
 table gardens or hold Autumn Fairs  
 and give prizes for best grown vege-  
 tables; in fact consider it a duty to do  
 anything and everything that will  
 bring about a greater food supply, the  
 sooner will we be enjoying the bless-  
 ings of peace.

The woman in the home has always  
 done considerable preserving and can-  
 ning, but this year it is a patriotic  
 Demand that her yield be at least  
 double that of former years. She must  
 devise schemes whereby she can pre-  
 serve the produce of her garden,  
 whether it be by canning, preserving,  
 drying or cold storage. And again the  
 organization has its part to play. Any  
 Woman is sure to take a deeper in-  
 terest in the preservation of food if  
 the works of her hands are to be ex-  
 hibited and there is a possibility of  
 her carrying off the prize.

**Canning Exhibit**

It is proposed to give the delegates  
 at the Fifth Annual Convention of the  
 New Brunswick Women's Institutes an  
 opportunity to see the results of wom-  
 en's efforts to save the foods to be  
 used during next winter and spring.  
 A canning exhibit will be an attraction.  
 Liberal prizes will be awarded to the  
 institutes for best quality of New  
 Brunswick grown canned fruits and  
 vegetables. Particulars as to this ex-  
 hibit will be forthcoming in the near  
 future.

"Pity 'tis, 'tis true," that this war  
 was needed to bring to light many dor-  
 mant talents. The war has given wom-  
 an her opportunity, but, alas, the suf-  
 fering, the misery, the sorrow involv-  
 ed! Would she not willingly have  
 waited until woman's part in the eco-  
 nomic development of her country had  
 come as a matter of course? This lat-  
 ent talent should be scattered abroad  
 and the organization should make use  
 of the woman to spread the gospel  
 along all lines of economy and produc-  
 tion. As never before, woman should  
 make a study of foods, their composi-  
 tion, selection, combination and prepa-  
 ration, so as to meet the needs of the  
 family without waste of money or ma-  
 terial.

**Department Willing.**

The Department of Agriculture is  
 ready and willing to co-operate with  
 any society wishing information along  
 all lines of thrift and production, whether  
 it be a canning demonstration, a  
 lecture, or both. In response to a cir-  
 cular as the nature of a public meet-  
 ing to be addressed by a Departmental  
 representative, Women's Institutes are  
 asking for talks on Institute work,  
 demonstrations in various lines of  
 cookery, lectures on Women's Respon-  
 sibilities of Today, etc. If anything is  
 desired in addition to what has been  
 requested, the department will meet  
 the wishes of the institutes, providing  
 same are confined to subjects that  
 stand for antional service and requests  
 are to hand by June 15th. In order to

comply with these requests the De-  
 partment is engaging a number of  
 trained workers for the summer and  
 fall months, and every effort will be  
 put forth to meet the needs of these  
 strenuous times.


