Sent to P. E. Island.

The remains of Miss Mary McManus, who died suddenly in this city Sunday night, were sent to Glenfarnham, P. E. I., this morning. Interment will be made there.

Accepted as Cadet.

Lt. Col. W. H. Gray has been notified that Lieut. John T. Gibson has been accepted as a cadet of the Royal Flying Corps at Toronto. Mr. Gibson now is at Toronto.

Will Reside in Florida.

Mrs. Fred Goodine, who has resided at Palm Beach, Florida, since last autumn, returned to this city last week with the children of her late husband. It is Mrs. Goodine's intention to return to Florida to make her home.

Collector at McAdam.

Mr. Fred T. Lister has been appointed collector of customs for the port of McAdam in succession to the late J. Wesley Hoyt. The salary is \$1,600 per year. The appointee has been in the customs service at McAdam for about twelve years.

Having Good Effect.

The agitation in favor of increased farm production is having a good effect. By yesterday's mail Mr. James Gilchrist, of the Provincial Immigration Office, St. John, received eight applications from farmers for boys and men to help them on their farms.

Mr. Mitchell Resigns.

Mr. J. W. Mitchell, superintendent of Dairying in the Provincial Agricultural Department, tendered his resignation last week. Mr. Mitchell came to Fredericton last autumn, having formerly been in the Manitoba Department of Dairying.

House Was Burned.

The dwelling on King street owned by the Earl of Ashburnham was burned down at the owner's request this morning, to destroy traces of tuberculosis. Members of the city fire department were present and no danger attended the fire.

Died at Ottawa.

Rev. Canon Hanington, rector of St. Bartholomew's church, Ottawa, died in that city on Sunday. He was a New Brunswicker, a son of the late Hon. Daniel Hanington of Shediac, and a brother of the late Judge Hanington. At one time he was rector of Woodstock.

Inspecting Officers Here.

Major General T. Benson, G. O. C. No. 6 Military District, Brigadier General H. H. McLean, G. O. C. troops, New Brunswick, and Major Jones, General Staff Officer, No. 6 Military District, have arrived in town and are inspecting the Kilties this afternoon.

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FREDERICTON MEN AGAIN IN THE CASUALTIES

Charles E. Clark Killed, and C. H. Cadwallader Slightly Wounded — Others Known Here.

Mrs. Lavinia Clark of Saunders street, this city, this morning received an official communication from Ottawa that her son, Gunner Charles Edward Clark, had been killed in action on May 5th. It is presumed that the death occurred in the fighting about Arras. The deceased was about twenty-one years of age. A brother left Canada last summer with a well known New Brunswick infantry unit. His widowed mother and two younger brothers survive. The deceased removed to Fredericton several years ago from Hoyt Station with his family which since has made its home here. He was an employee of the Hart Boot & Shoe Company and was prominently connected with the George Street Baptist church. When the first field artillery units were raised here in the autumn of 1914 he enlisted. The news of his death has been received with regret by a large circle of friends.

Within a short time of being notified of his death his mother received from the letter carrier two letters written by him on April 21st and 25th, probably the last he wrote.

Pte. C. H. Cadwallader.

Prof. Edward Cadwallader of University avenue, has received official notification that his son, Private C. H. Cadwallader has been admitted to hospital with slight wounds received May 2nd. Private Cadwallader enlisted in Winnipeg at the beginning of the war as a bandsman and went to England in that capacity. After being in England for some time he volunteered to serve in the ranks and went to France. Although he has seen service from the early days of the fighting in which the Canadians have been engaged this is his first injury.

Artillerymen Wounded.

Several artillerymen well known here are reported wounded. Corp. Devere Jack and Gunner D. M. Watson, both hailing from North Sydney, who were stationed in Fredericton for some time with a field battery raised in Cape Breton, are reported wounded.

GOVERNORS FOR VETERANS' ASS'N ARE APPOINTED

Ald. Jos. Walker, J. H. Brooks and A. B. Kitchen Selected Auxiliary to be Formed Shortly.

The feature of last night's meeting of the members of the European War Veterans' Association was the excellent financial report presented to the meeting by S. M. J. Hanlon, secretary-treasurer of the Association, as a result of the recent dance at the Old Government House and the concert at the Opera House. The boys have now a promising balance in the bank, which will provide the nucleus for its proposed club-house home for returned Veterans. The meeting also elected three governors, who will act as trustees for the citizens and assist in the financial welfare of the organization. They are Alderman Joseph Walker representing the City Council, Mr. J. H. Brooks, manager of the Bank of B. N. A. and Mr. A. B. Kitchen.

Public Meeting.

A public meeting will shortly be held when the aims and objects of the Veterans' Association will be explained, looking to a continued support of the organization. An auxiliary is also to be formed, embracing the parents, wives and relatives of all men who are at the front and who have returned and of those who have laid down their lives for the cause. Mr. Bud Tippett, of the St. John organization and Mr. Charles Robinson, secretary of the Provincial Aid Commission, will be invited to visit Fredericton, the former for a report on the recent convention held at Winnipeg, when plans for a Dominion wide organization were laid.

Thanks to the Kilties.

In view of the departure of the 236th, President George Betts, voiced the sentiments of the gathering in presenting a vote of thanks to those members of the local battalion who, during their stay in Fredericton joined the Veterans and so assisted financially in its support, also to Captain Percy F. Godenrath, whose work in helping reorganize the Veterans was greatly appreciated.
