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COL. McLEOD ACCUSES MR. PINDER OF TREACHERY

The following is the Gleaner's report of a speech delivered at the County Court House on February 12th, 1914, by Colonel H. F. McLeod, then as now, Conservative M. P. for York:

Ever since he was 19 years old he had always been out in the fight at every election in this County, and had always given Mr. Pinder loyal support. On the other hand, MR. PINDER HAD NOT ALWAYS BEEN LOYAL in his support of him (McLeod), AND NO FURTHER EVIDENCE OF THIS FACT WAS NEEDED THAN THE VOTE IN THE LAST GENERAL PROVINCIAL ELECTION AT TEMPERANCE VALE, where Mr. Pinder and his friends had carved his (McLeod's) name off 40 votes.

Regarding the convention at which Mr. Guthrie was nominated, Hon. Mr. McLeod said there was no doubt that the feeling of THE CONVENTION HAD BEEN OVERWHELMINGLY IN FAVOR OF MR. GUTHRIE. The method pursued in conducting the convention had been entirely in accord with the wishes and desires expressed by Mr. Thomas, who had acted as chairman, and it was upon motion of one of Mr. Thomas' supporters, after Mr. Thomas had said that he preferred the selection to be made in that way, that it was decided to make the selection in open convention.

PINDER'S INDEPENDENCE.

Mr. Pinder was trying to praise the Government to an extent and at the same time play the part of an independent man; MR. PINDER'S INDEPENDENCE HAD ALWAYS ASSERTED ITSELF AT A TIME WHEN HE WAS LOOKING TO SERVE SOME PERSONAL ENDS, and felt he could play the "independent" game to make things come his way. It was the first time that Mr. Pinder in his long political career had ever made such an alliance, and it could be construed as nothing more nor less than a desperate man who felt he was making his stand in the last ditch. In this connection he wished to CONTRAST THE STANDS TAKEN BY HIMSELF AND MR. PINDER IN MATTERS IN WHICH THE TEMPERANCE CAUSE WAS AFFECTED, and let the people judge for themselves whether he or Mr. Pinder was the person deserving of the support of the temperance people and of the friends of the cause of temperance.

In 1908, when the Government which had been formed by Hon. Mr. Hazen came into office, one of the first things the members for York were asked to do was to name a police commission to be appointed by the Government for the City of Fredericton, the enforcement of the Scott Act in this city to be one of the functions of the Commission. MR. PINDER NAMED THREE MEN, FOR COMMISSIONERS AT THE DICTATES OF THE LIQUOR INTERESTS OF THE CITY; but Hon. Mr. Hazen, who was then Premier, said he would hold up the matter until he (McLeod) came back, being away at the time.

LOOK OUT FOR ROORBACHS FROM GOVERNMENT ORGAN

Read What It Said About the Men Who Supported Mr. J. M. Scott on the Eve of the York By-Election of 1914---Subsequent Events Amply Proved That the Shoe Was on the Other Foot---Ready to Follow the Same Tactics Now.

As election day approaches, the electors of the city and county should be on the lookout for roorbachs from the government organ of this city. On the eve of the Guthrie-Scott by-election the Gleaner handed out the following:

THE BOODLE FUND FOR SCOTT PARTY

Candidate's Son Gets Bundle of New \$1 and \$2 Bills from the Royal Bank of Canada—Most Glaring Attempt to Debauch Electorate Ever Practiced in an Election in York County.

Every day is bringing fresh developments to show that the efforts to make the opposition to Percy A. Guthrie, the Provincial Government party's candidate, appear as a purity campaign is the greatest deception which has ever been foisted upon the electors of York County.

The letter which Ald. Howard Rogers, of reciprocity fame, now chairman of the Scott campaign committee, forwarded to John Oldham, who joined the Grouchers because he didn't land every job he went after, and which is published in the Gleaner today, shows that the so-called purists are preparing to debauch the electorate.

The opposition to Mr. Guthrie in this fight have a boodle fund. Only yesterday Stanley Scott, son of James M. Scott, the Pinder-Mitchell candidate, visited the Royal Bank of Canada and there secured a large bundle of \$1 and \$2 bills, which are always so popular and prominent at election times. The exact amount of the roll which the candidate's son carried away from the bank is not known, but one man described it as being of large proportions.

SCOTT THROWS UP THE SPONGE.

An interesting interview took place yesterday afternoon over the telephone between Mr. Jas. M. Scott and Mr. James K. Pinder.

"You told me," said Mr. Scott to

Mr. Pinder, "that the whole county was with you, and that you could give me all the Conservative organization. I have been around a good deal, until I got caught in this unlucky snow storm, and I find now that you have deceived me. You have no friends as you have no part of the Conservative organization to help me out in any other parish than your own, and that is only to help you. There are no committees at work who know anything, or can tell me anything and if I lose my deposit, as it looks now, I want you to understand that I will make it darn warm for you. This is the meanest trap I have ever been caught in."

Nothing more need be added. This tells the whole story of the present campaign in York better than can be told with any polish of words. This is an expression of disgust and disappointment that comes direct from the heart. It is an admission of fact that at once illustrates the depths to which Mr. Pinder will descend at the expense of his friends to make trouble for the party who declines to serve his personal ends at the expense of the honor of the Province.

Everybody knows that there was a boodle fund at the time of the by-election, but it was not used by the friends of Mr. Scott. Some of the money, about \$5,000, was raised at the 11th hour on a promissory note endorsed by prominent workers of the party. The endorsers got stuck for the amount of the note, and were compelled to pay it, less the amount of \$500 contributed by Mr. J. B. Daggett, and \$75 from one J. Malakoff Chappell.

WHOLE FAMILY WAS ASPHYXIATED

Calgary, Alta., Feb. 20.—That Mr. and Mrs. Fred Dose, their daughter Alma, aged 1 and Elsie, aged 6; Minnie Tankrotz, aged 19, a sister of Mrs. Dose, and Albert Tankrotz, aged 2, lost their lives from asphyxiation by gas from an exploded coal stove, is the opinion of Corporal Smith of the Mounted Police, after an investigation of a tragedy which occurred near Tabor, Alberta. Charred bones were found in the ruins, indicating that a number of bodies had been cremated in the resulting fire. The family were Germans who had resided in the district for five years.

PATRIOTIC FUND STEADILY GROWING

Ottawa, Feb. 20.—The patriotic generosity of Canadian people is strikingly emphasized in contributions to the Patriotic Fund, a grand total of \$33,000,000 is now in sight.

When the fund was first talked of the opinion was expressed that the country would do well if five million was secured.

Successful campaigns have brought forward in cash \$19,389,746 up to the present, while \$14,000,000 is pledged but not actually paid in as yet.

Included in the latter are the latest contributions from Montreal and Toronto.

ARMED MERCHANTMEN ARRIVE FROM EUROPE

PINDERS MANIPULATIONS OF PUBLIC FUNDS

Refused to Pay For a Horse Bought From the Government Says The Gleaner.

But the people are more interested in Mr. Pinder's manipulation of the public funds. Has he not abused his position, much to the regret of those who were his friends, in nearly everything he has undertaken, while at the same time suspecting nearly everyone else of dishonesty and making a great howl about what he alleges nearly everyone else was busy at. Three years or more ago, when the Kentucky importation of horses were offered for sale, and later, Mr. Pinder bought some stock ostensibly for an agricultural society, but as a matter of fact for his own use. He gave the Agricultural Department a note for \$1,100. Others who had given similar notes for stock purchased, honorably met their obligations. Not so with Mr. Pinder. Pressed for payment of that note given three years ago, bearing 3 per cent. interest, he takes advantage of the influence of his position as a member of the Legislature and does not pay. A while ago, when it became necessary to threaten him with proceedings if some payment were not made, he gave his personal cheque for \$300. This cheque, together with the note, now lies unpaid in the treasury vaults of this province. In the meantime, the Kentucky horse which Mr. Pinder purchased, has been used in his lumbering operations in winter and in farming in summer; the whole transaction being a travesty upon the position to which he was elected before the facts were known as to the methods of his manipulations.

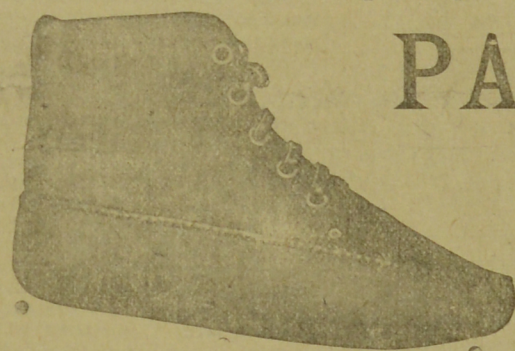

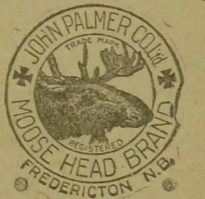
THE ISSUE CLEARLY DEFINED.

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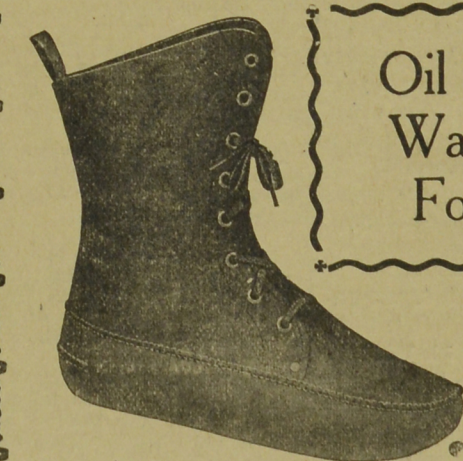

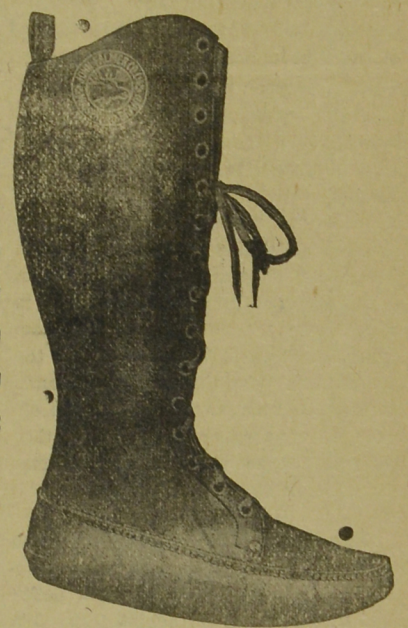
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
