FOREST SURVEY PARTY.

Fifteen Men Following the Transcontinental Railway.

A Crown Land forest survey party, consisting of about fifteen men, started work again Feb. 1st in the vicinity of Pangburn, N. B., on the Transcontinental Railway, and will work towards Moncton, N. B.

They report good snow-shoeing and in spite of cold weather and snow are living comfortably in tents and hauling supplies on hand-sleds or toboggans. They will work until the spring break-up, which comes usually about the middle of April, when they will be in until the summer season.

TO GET AFTER THE SUGAR REFINERIES

Ottawa, Feb. 20.—The Attorney General of Alberta has given his consent to a prosecution under the cost of living act of the British Columbia Sugar Refineries Co.

Similar consent by the Attorney General of British Columbia is now awaited by W. F. O'Connor, K. C., investigating commissioner.

The company will be indicted on the charge of criminal conspiracy in fixing the retail as well as the wholesale prices of its commodity in contravention of the law.

It is also intended to institute criminal proceedings against a certain wholesale firm which puts forth the plea that agreements of this nature are a common custom and declines to admit that they are illegal. The commissioner proposes to illuminate them on this.

EXTORTED MONEY FROM LIQUOR LICENCEES

(St. John Telegraph.)

As to the liquor charges Hon. Mr. Morrissey is a most impressive witness. He asked Premier Clarke why the government refused the request of the Opposition to have Royal Commissioner Chandler investigate "the collection of large sums of money from liquor licensees under our government while the Legislature was in session."

Mr. Morrissey continued: "Who prompted that refusal, Would not one word from you to Royal Commissioner Chandler appointed him, aye encouraged him to investigate so important a matter as that?"

"In proof of Mr. Carter's charges, Mr. Richard Sullivan, a wholesale liquor merchant of St. John, told me a few days ago that \$6,000 or thereabouts was collected from the liquor interests and paid over, and that \$2,000 more was demanded and they refused to pay such additional demand."

Paid over to whom?
Demanded by whom?
What became of the money?
On what representations was it demanded and paid?

Let these questions be answered by the gentlemen who are now telling the electors this movement has "nothing to fear or to conceal."

If that investigation had been granted, if all hands had been called and sworn, the people of New Brunswick would have known who got the \$6,000 and tried to get \$2,000 more, and why the money was paid and what was its ultimate destination.

What is the use of members of the government and their supporters telling the public they have nothing to fear or conceal? The facts prove both fear and concealment.
