MANY NEW INDUSTRIES ARE LOCATING IN CANADA

Millions of Dollars Invested in
Building Plants Along the
Grand Trunk.

Montreal, March 15.—The industrial
development of Eastern Canada is con-
tinuing in truly remarkable fashion.
Many new industries are locating in
this territory each month, big new
plants are being erected and many of
the established concerns are making
large additions to their factories.
Mr. Wm. P. Fitzsimmons, Commis-
sioner of Industries, Grand Trunk Railway
System, states that there is great ac-
tivity among manufacturers in this
regard in all the centres served by the
railway. New plants representing a
capital investment of nearly \$12,000,-
000, have been placed along the com-
pany's lines within the last twelve
months. These new industries number
approximately 75 and will employ more
than 10,000 hands when in full opera-
tion. An additional \$5,000,000 was ex-
pended in that period in extensions to
manufactories, providing work for an-
other 4,000 men.

Among the largest of the industrial
concerns to select locations served by
the Grand Trunk, during the past year
were the Dominion Sugar Company,
Ltd., at Chatham, British Munitions,
Ltd., Montreal; St. Catharines Steel
& Metal Co., at St. Catharines; Kellogg
Toasted Cornflakes Co., at Toronto;
the Dominion Dustless Sweeper Co.,
at Peterboro, and William Kennedy &
Sons, Ltd., at Collingwood. These six
plants alone represent an investment
of approximately \$3,000,000.

Among the plants under construction
is a large refinery at Port Colborne,
Ont., for the International Nickel Co.
of New York and New Jersey. The
building of this plant is of national im-
portance, not only because of the large
investment involved, amounting to
several million dollars, but because it
places within the Dominion the refin-
ing of invaluable nickel ore and the
distribution of the finished nickel,
work which had been previously done
outside of Canada.

CZAR'S MANIFESTO ANNOUN- CING HIS ABIDICATION

Petrograd, March 17, via London.—
The following is the text of the Imper-
ial manifesto in which the Russian
Emperor announced his abdication and
that of his son:

"We, Nicholas II, by the Grace of
God, Emperor of all the Russias, Em-
peror of Poland and Grand Duke of
Finland, etc., make known to all our
faithful subjects: In the day of the
great struggle against a foreign foe
who has been striving for three years
to enslave our country, God has wish-
ed to send to Russia a new and pain-
ful trial. Interior troubles threaten to
have a fatal effect on the final outcome
of the war. The destinies of Russia
and the honor of our dear fatherland
require that the war be prosecuted at
all cost to a victorious end. The cruel
enemy is making his last effort and
the moment is near when our valiant
army, in concert with those of our glo-
rious allies, will definitely chastise the
foe.

The Closest Union.

"In these decisive days in the life
of Russia we believe our people should
have the closest union and organiza-
tion of all their forces for the realiza-
tion of speedy victory. For this reason,
in accord with the Duma of the
empire, we have considered it desir-
able to abdicate the throne of Russia
and lay aside our supreme power. Not
wishing to be separated from our loved
son, we leave our heritage to our brother,
the Grand Duke Michael Alex-
androvitch, blessing his advent to the
throne of Russia. We hand over the
government to our brother in full union
with the representatives of the nation
who are seated in the legislative
chambers, taking this step with an in-
violable oath in the name of our well-
beloved country. We call on all faith-
ful sons of the Fatherland to fulfil
their sacred patriotic duty in this pain-
ful moment of national trial, and to aid
our brother and the representatives of
the nation in bringing Russia into the
path of prosperity and glory. May
God aid Russia."

Grand Duke Michael Accepts.

London, March 17.—Grand Duke
Michael has accepted the throne of
Russia, conditional on the consent of
the Russian people, according to a
statement received here today from
the semi-official Russian news agency.
The statement follows:

"Grand Duke Michael Alexandro-
vitch, accepting the throne from his
brother, declares that he does so 'only
with the consent of the Russian peo-
ple, who should by a plebiscite estab-
lish a new form of government and
new fundamental laws.'"

New Government Endorsed.

Petrograd, via London, March 16.—
The council of nobility already has
held special meetings in fifteen pro-
vinces and endorsed the new revolu-
tionary government.

New York, March 16.—The Chron-
icle, a monthly magazine which was
announced some time ago as being "of,
society, by society and for society,"
has made its appearance.

Don't look for it, however, among
the periodicals handled by your news-
boy on the corner. Under its title are
printed the words, "issued only to
subscribers at \$12 a year." In other
words, the Chronicle costs \$1 per copy
and you cannot get it unless you have
subscribed the whole \$12. It contains
no advertisements or illustrations.

Among the contributors to the first
number are Mrs. Harry Payne Whit-
ney, Jay Gould, Francis Roche, Miss
Elizabeth Marbury, Mrs. Benjamin
Guinness, Mrs. William Astor Chanler,
Mrs. Muriel Draper and Joseph H.
Choate.

Choate, that veteran barrister, in a
letter to the editor, describes the
Chronicle as "a medium through which
intelligent people who are not profes-
sional writers may speak to the pub-
lic on the topics of the day."

vance proofs, professional writers need

cluded from its pages. The leading
article, unsigned, is entitled "The

CANADIAN BANKS SUBSCRIBE TO THE WAR LOAN

Ottawa, March 16.—The announce-
ment was made tonight that the Cana-
dian banks have subscribed \$60,000,-
000 to the victory war loan. General
returns of the war loan so far received
here indicate that the number of sub-
scriptions will be about the same as in
the case of the war loan of 1916. Des-
patches received by the Department
of Finance from Montreal, Toronto,
Winnipeg and other cities, show that
the subscriptions are quite up to ex-
pectations. The subscriptions of the

been averted.






