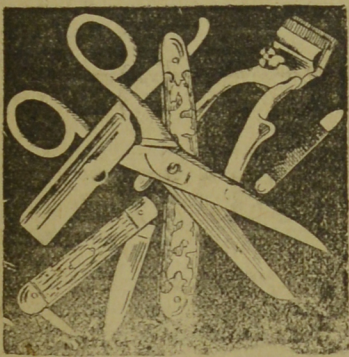

CANDIDATES ENDORSED BY FEDERAL GOVERNMENT

List of Those in the Maritime Provinces Who Are Recognized as Unionist--Premier Borden Issues a Statement on the Situation--Regrets so Many Acclamations in Quebec--Quebec Unionist Have Deposits Seized.

Toronto, Nov. 21. — In a statement issued at noon today, Sir Robert Borden says: "The Union nominations throughout Canada indicate a thorough realization of the serious issues involved in this election. Strong representative men have been nominated in all the provinces. It was anticipated and hoped that in Quebec there would be a Union candidate in every constituency. Unfortunately this anticipation was not realized."

"In eleven constituencies arrangements to have the candidates in the field failed at the last moment. However, the fact that fifty-four Union candidates are in the field in Quebec indicates a substantial body of public opinion behind the Union government in that province."

"I have observed with some surprise a statement by a member of the judiciary in this city as to the calling up of the married men in February next. There is no authority however, for any such statement and there is no necessity, so far as I am aware, for any such course as he outlines. Up to the present time no such action has been under consideration either by the minister of militia or by the government as a whole. It is anticipated that all requirements can be met out of the class already called up."

Demands Investigation.

Toronto, Nov. 21. — Comparing the percentage of exemptions refused in Toronto with those in Montreal, the Globe says editorially today: "Toronto has already provided almost 50,000 men for overseas service, a greater number than the entire province of Quebec. Montreal is still swarming with men fit for the trenches. Why is it that the tribunals are exempting so great a proportion of these men? Is the law obeyed? The figures indicate evasion, it is the intention of the government to appeal against the decisions of the tribunals, so that there should be an equal and impartial enforcement of the act in every part of the Dominion?"

"Much depends on the answer given to these questions."

Ottawa Man Defies Law.

Ottawa, Nov. 21. — Harold Morris, clerk in the interior department, arraigned in the police court charged with, while being in class 1, refusing to comply with the terms of the Military Service Act, in that he did not report for military service or appear before a military tribunal any apply for exemption. Morris pleaded guilty to the charge and was remanded for a week by Magistrate Askwith, who stated the decision of the court would be handed on to the minister of justice to be dealt with.

Morris refused absolutely to retract from the stand he took when he was arraigned last week, in spite of every effort made to persuade him to consult his friends, by the court, claiming that his utter lack of sympathy with the war aims of the belligerent government precluded the possibility of his submitting his case to the arbitration of a military tribunal.

Two Deposits Seized.

Quebec, Nov. 21. — The official deposit in money made by two candidates in the present Federal election have been seized for debt. The deposit of P. Furois of Quebec city, Unionist candidate in Bonaventure county, has been seized, as was that of H. Grenier, also of this city, candidate in Bellechasse, on the Unionist ticket.

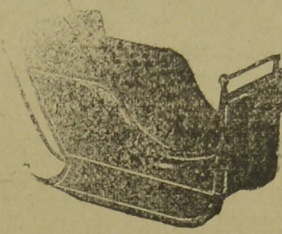

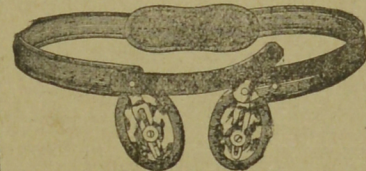
