THE ELECTION BILL JAMMED THROUGH COMMITTEE STAGE

The Steam Roller Being Overworked by the Moribund Government at Ottawa---Premier Borden Squirmed Under Mr. Carvell's Criticism---Member for Carleton Describes Bill as "Horrible Piece of Legislation."

Ottawa, Sept. 12. — The dying Borden administration used ruthlessly again today the closure steam-roller to force through its election-stealing measure. Premier Borden has sacrificed deliberately all his former pose of seeking unity of war effort among all classes of Canadians. The franchise bill, a frankly admitted election winning dodge, was jammed through the committee stage at the end of today's sitting despite all the objections of Liberals to its obvious unfairness and inconsistencies. A few minor amendments were consented to by the government, but the vital defects remained.

There are no "scenes." Opposition to the "war time election act" voiced itself in dignified criticism, biting in its contempt for the men who have posed as patriots and revealed themselves as petty politicians, men prepared to sacrifice noble professions to sordid practices.

Few incidents in Canada's parliament have been more significant than Wednesday's early morning interchange between Premier Borden and the man he has for weeks been seeking for his "union" cabinet.

"I am amazed at the prime minister of Canada," declared Mr. F. B. Carvell. "I simply cannot get around it, Mr. Chairman. If it were some other member on the opposite side of the house I should not have been surprised, but that a man who knows what justice is, that a man of his education and training, should try to force a measure of this kind through in one day! It simply amazes me."

Premier Borden, manifestly uncomfortable, sought to explain that he was afraid lest the senate should delay the passage of the bill if too much time were taken with it in the commons.

"I cannot speak for the other house and I do not intend to try," commented the New Brunswick congressman. "I am only speaking for myself. I am not obstructing the bill at all."

"I do not claim that my honorable friend is obstructing," replied the premier.

"I feel very serious over this matter," declared Mr. Carvell, quietly, but stinging, "and very bitter, too."

"I think my honorable friend's criticism has been reasonable," was all the premier apologetically responded.

When the house met this afternoon the premier announced his readiness to move closure unless Sir Wilfrid Laurier would give assurance that the third reading would be reached by Saturday. The Liberal leader said it was not the purpose of the opposition to prolong the consideration of the measure one minute more than was necessary, but he could not bow to any threat or give any undertaking under such conditions. The closure was then moved in committee and adopted on a straight party vote of 43 to 35.

"This is the most horrible piece of legislation I have ever known," was Mr. Carvell's comment.

All day, and until 2 o'clock this (Thursday) morning the house deliberated upon the bill in committee. It was significant of the sentiment in which the government's remarkable course in delaying the presentation of the measure until the dying days of an overdrawn session and immediately adopting closure, was regarded, that no effort was made by the premier or the chair to enforce the twenty-minute speaking rule, and discussion proceeded as under ordinary unclosed conditions.

Several important amendments were secured by Liberals. A protest by Mr. Fred Pardee against the reinstatement of the non-resident vote, hitherto long since done away with, resulted in the adoption of an amendment inserting the words "and resident of Canada" after the words "British subjects" in the qualifying clause.

Criticism by Mr. F. B. Carvell as to the unfairness of the time allotted for posting voters' lists, appeals, etc., secured amendments under which the time for posting the lists was extended from ten to fifteen days, the time for entering appeals extended from three to five days before polling, and the time for the collection of lists also extended accordingly.

During the course of the discussion it was stated by Mr. Carvell that the New Brunswick government would introduce a new franchise act at the next session.
