Game Licenses Distributed to Vendors—On Sale Here Tomorrow—Heavy Mortality Among Deer.

The hunting season for big game in New Brunswick will open on Saturday the 15th inst., and already several parties of non-resident sportsmen from the United States have arrived to get an early start. Some are actually in the woods.

The Department of Lands and Mines has sent the game licenses to the vendors in the various parts of the province with the exception of Fredericton and immediate vicinity. They will be on sale here tomorrow.

Many Deer Died in Winter.

Guides report that there was a heavy mortality among deer in this province last winter. Hundreds of carcasses were found on the yards during the spring. It is believed that a disease closely akin to pneumonia was prevalent among the deer. There are still many deer in the province, however, and it is expected that the usual number will be killed.

Non-resident Parties Arrive.

Guide W. H. Allen of Pennac is to take into the Miramichi woods a party of Americans who arrived this morning and registered at the Barker House. It is composed of Mr. W. Lloyd Allen of Newton, Mass.; Mr. William A. Proudfoot of Ardsley, Mass.; Mr. H. O. Hunt of Newton, Mass.; Dr. F. F. Fish and Mr. F. W. Bowers of Lancaster, Pa.

Mr. and Mrs. E. E. C. Hosack of Jamaica, who returned from a fishing trip yesterday, will go into the woods after big game.

Guide Charles Cremin of this city, expects a party of eight Americans tomorrow, who will hunt with him on the headwaters of the Tobique.

AGE LIMIT FOR
MOTOR DRIVERS
TO BE OBSERVED

Motor Vehicles Branch of Department of Public Works Issues Circular Letter to Police Chiefs.

The Motor Vehicles Branch of the Provincial Department of Public Works has issued a circular letter to all chiefs of police and others concerned in the enforcement of the law, calling attention to the fact that the section of the Motor Vehicles Act prohibiting any person under the age of eighteen from driving a motor vehicle is not being observed. Mention is made of the fact that a most regrettable accident at Sussex recently resulted in the loss of the life of a valued citizen, the motor car causing the accident being driven by a boy aged fifteen years. The life lost in that accident was that of C. W. MacDougall, provincial dairying superintendent.

The circular further states that many persons have an erroneous impression to the effect that a person under the age of eighteen may drive if accompanied by a licensed driver. The law states without qualification that no person under that age may drive a car.

Strict enforcement of this provision of the act is requested.


After Big Game.
