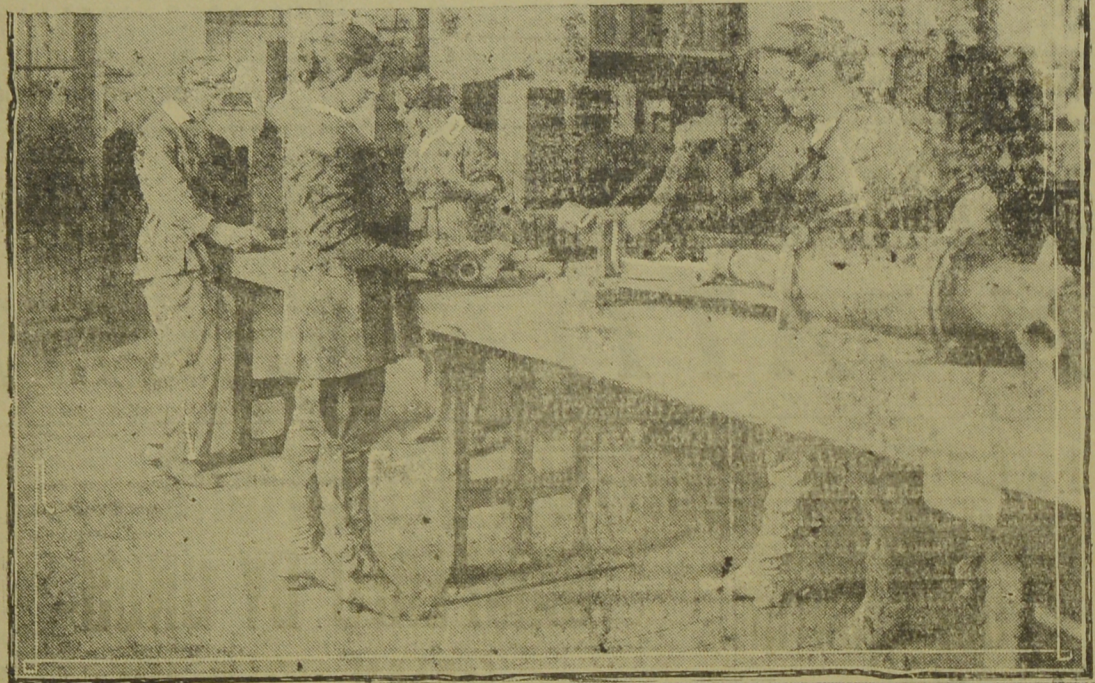
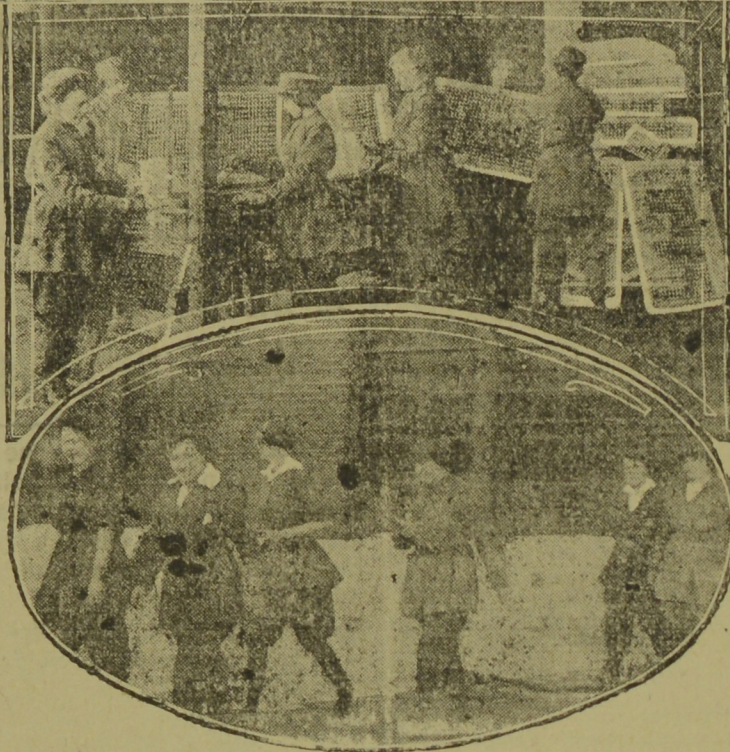


# Fashions in the Factory

## 257TH BATTALION IN FRANCE BY APRIL 15TH

Railway Construction Corps--Men  
With Minor Physical Defects  
Accepted.

The 257th Railway Construction Battalion is appealing for recruits in New Brunswick and applications can be made by intending recruits. One company is to be raised in this province under the command of Major C. F. Harrington. Headquarters are at 59 Water street, St. John.

Minor physical defects do not bar recruits from this unit. The height standard is only 5 feet 11 inches. The eyesight test is low. Men who have lost one eye will be accepted if the eyesight requirements are met by the remaining eye. Flat feet are not a bar if the man can walk five miles in comfort. Deafness in one ear is not a bar either. Two fingers off either hand or two toes off either or both feet, the great toe excepted, will not bar a man from the unit. The age limit is 18 to 48 years.

The 257th will be in France by the middle of April, as railway building is urgently needed.
