THE DORCHESTER ELECTION

The Federal by-election in the county of Dorchester, P. Q., on Saturday resulted in the return of Hon. Albert Seigney, Conservative-Nationalist, by a majority of 276 over Mr. Lucien Cannon, Liberal. It was a red-hot campaign and focussed public attention all over Canada. The Conservatives realized what a great loss of prestige the defeat of a cabinet minister would be to them at the present time, and determined to hold the seat at all costs. Two other Nationalist cabinet ministers, Hon. P. E. Blondin and Hon. T. L. Patenaude, camped in the constituency and were accompanied by an army of experienced political workers gathered from all over the province. They had barrels of money and oceans of rum and seem to have made good use of it. Under the circumstances, a victory for the Hon. Mr. Seigney is not a matter for surprise. Five years ago, running as a Nationalist candidate, without influence or patronage, he carried the constituency by a majority of 332. On Saturday, running as a Federal cabinet minister, with all the resources of civilization at his disposal, he bested his opponent by a majority of 276. When all of the facts are taken into consideration, there is nothing very remarkable in his performance, and it should not in the least dishearten those who are fighting for a better administration of affairs at Ottawa.

The result in Dorchester may cause Tory politicians in the English-speaking provinces who have planned to raise the race cry against Quebec in the approaching Federal election, to adopt different tactics. The Tory-Nationalist hold is a very strong one, and will not be easily shaken off. The Nationalist leaders will claim now that they can deliver the goods in Quebec, and will point to the result in Dorchester as proof. Mr. W. A. Boys, an Ontario Tory member, let the cat out of the bag in the House of Commons when he said that nothing better could happen to the Conservative party than the defeat of Seigney. From this it is safe to assume that the minister's return to Parliament will not bring any great amount of joy to the Orange wing of the party in Ontario.

The result of the election will, of course, cause great rejoicing among the war profiteers and boddies, who no doubt were called upon to provide the sinews of war. A joyous shout will go up also from the graft newspapers of the country, which will easily construe the result as a great vindication for the Borden government.

The County of Dorchester is a traditional Tory seat and is generally regarded as safe for the party. The late Sir Hector Langevin represented it at Ottawa from 1867 until 1874. He was succeeded by Mr. Rouleau, another Conservative, who in the election of 1878 had 1,186 majority. The county was represented by a Liberal from 1887 until 1896, when it returned to the Conservative fold. Mr. J. A. E. Roy, a Liberal, represented the county from 1908 until 1911, and was defeated by Mr. Seigney in the latter year.

St. John Times: The Westmorland county council has gone on record in a very vigorous protest moved by a prominent Conservative and supported by other Conservatives, against the Dominion Government for permitting the enormous profits made out of munitions while the people are asked to tax themselves for patriotic purposes. The council adopted the resolution unanimously. The St. John Standard, which asserts that "the Borden government is adding strength to strength," carefully suppresses the news from Westmorland. That is one way of conducting a newspaper.

Sales have been made in New York of between \$23,000,000 and \$30,000,000 worth of German government bonds. The bonds were brought across by the Deutschland, Germany's merchant submarine. The bonds were packed in the smallest possible compass, for space on the submarine is valuable. It is said the bonds were subjected to hydraulic pressure and sealed in tin boxes. Upon the arrival of Capt. Koenig at New London, Conn., the bonds were shipped at once to the German Embassy in Washington. Fearing lest the submarine might be captured by the Allies, it is said the bonds were so phrased that they were of no value without the signature of Count Von Bernstorff, the German Ambassador.

The period in which goods of enemy origin bought before the war may be sold in Australia has been extended until Jan. 31. This permission to sell applies to wholesale dealers and there is now practically no restriction upon the retailer. Wholesale merchants have complained that they could not sell their goods at all, as retailers were afraid to buy, and this new move by the government will probably reassure the trading community.

Fifty-four persons were lynched in the United States in 1916, according to records of Tuskegee Institute, Alabama. Fifty of the victims were negroes and four white persons, and included in the record are three negro women. Sixty-seven persons were lynched in 1915, thirteen of whom were white men.

MONCTON HEARS SOME POLITICAL RUMORS

COMMODORE STEWART
AND THE SENATE

Dr. Bourque's appointment leaves Kent with only one representative, Hon. Dr. Landry, in the Legislature. The government, as a war measure of economy, ought to ask the Imperial parliament to abolish the Canadian Senate. It is a useless body, and seats in it are merely plums or plunder with which politicians are required to satisfy the necessary racial, sectarian, sectional and political pull. The filling of the other vacancies will give the Conservatives a majority in the Senate. They should vote it out of existence.

McNAMARA SETTLES
DOWN TO WORK

San Quentin, Cal., Jan. 27.—After spending 24 days in the dungeon of the state prison here, J. B. McNamara agreed to obey orders and today began work in the jute mill.

McNamara, who is serving a life term for his confessed part in the dynamiting of the Los Angeles Times building in 1910, had been working in the prison laundry, but his work was unsatisfactory and he was ordered to the jute mill. On his refusal to go there he was placed in the dungeon. Every day he was taken out and asked if he were ready to obey orders, and until yesterday he regularly refused.
