

**NATIONALIST CANDIDATE
WON IN DORCHESTER, P.Q.**

Hon. Albert Sevigny Defeated Mr. Lucien Cannon by a Majority of 276—A Hot Campaign brought to a Close—How the Result is Viewed in Political Circles At Ottawa.

Montreal, Jan. 28.—Hon. Albert Sevigny, Conservative-Nationalist, defeated Lucien Cannon in the by-election in Dorchester county on Saturday by 276 majority.

A Doubtful Victory.

Ottawa, Jan. 28.—Whether Mr. Sevigny's win in Dorchester was really a victory or a defeat is what members of parliament on both sides of politics are now trying to figure out. There is not nearly so much jubilation in the Conservative camp over the news of yesterday's by-election as might be expected. Nor is there apparent any depression in the Liberal camp.

On Wednesday last in the Commons, speaking from the Conservative side of the House, W. A. Boys, of South Simcoe, declared that from a political standpoint the defeat of Mr. Sevigny would be the best thing that could happen the Conservative party. The reason was evident. The English speaking supporters of the government have long had their plans laid for an election campaign fought on the Quebec issue. The intention has been to work up racial prejudice against Sir Wilfrid Laurier as the representative of the French Canadians and to allege in the English speaking provinces that in re-

ality he typified Nationalist sentiment in Quebec.

The difficulty in the way of this campaign hitherto has been the dominance of the Nationalist representation in the Borden cabinet. A chance for a definite break with the Nationalists and a final disruption of the Nationalist-Conservative alliance was hoped for. Had Mr. Cannon won, the cry would have been raised in Ontario, the Maritime Provinces and the west, that a combination of Nationalist and Liberal votes had beaten Sevigny. This opportunity has now passed.

Satisfaction on the Liberal Side.

On the Liberal side there is satisfaction in the knowledge that the campaign has shown to the whole of Canada the irreconcilable cleavage between Liberalism and Nationalism in Quebec. The fight carried on in Dorchester will be continued and won at the next general election.

The most amusing story of all which was brought in today is to the effect that two of the campaign workers for the government candidate, took advantage of the hint given by Mr. Blondin as to how to escape conscription. They moved across the line and, it is said, took with them \$11,000 of campaign funds.

GERMAN CONSPIRATOR
PROMISED PROMOTION

San Francisco, Jan. 27.—Franz Bopp, former German consul general here, recently convicted of neutrality violations and sentenced to three years imprisonment, will be given "promotion" on his return to Germany, according to a declaration made here by Erich Zoepffel, acting German consul general, to a large crowd of Germans gathered last night to celebrate Emperor William's birthday.

Bopp received an enthusiastic reception from his countrymen when he took the platform to introduce Zoepffel, his successor.

The latter thanked them for the reception, and assured them that promotion awaited his predecessor.

When asked later to amplify his remarks, Mr. Zoepffel said he had nothing to say.

SENDS CONGRATULATIONS TO KAISER

Washington, Jan. 27.—President Wilson today cabled Emperor William formal congratulations on the fifty-eighth anniversary of his birth. This is the custom on the birthdays of all foreign sovereigns.

Secretary of State Lansing and his three chief assistants, left their congratulations at the German embassy.

Late Charles Carlisle.

The funeral of the late Charles Carlisle took place Sunday afternoon at Douglas, and was largely attended. Service was conducted by Rev. Mr. Perry, assisted by Rev. Dr. Kierstead. Interment was made at the Carlisle burying ground.

CRY OF "FIRE" AT
ST. PAUL'S CHURCH

Drunken Man Alarmed the Congregation at Close of Sndday Service.

When the service in St. Paul's Presbyterian Church was nearing its close last evening, a man appeared at the door and shouted "Fire!" three times at the top of his voice, and then damped. Many in the congregation at once rose to their feet, and left the edifice, but fortunately they moved out quietly and there was no panic. About one half of the congregation remained until the close of the service.

The culprit who gave the false alarm got out of sight very quickly. It is thought that he must have been under the influence of liquor.

It is a serious offence to disturb a religious meeting and in this case there came very near being a panic.

The matter is being investigated, and it is thought probable that the culprit can be located.
