## SENATOR CLORAN SHOWS HOW TORIES ABUSED THE TRUCE

Vacancies in the Senate all Filled by Partisans of Tory Party--The Military Bill Given a Third Reading--The Liberals Desirous That the Vote of the Soldiers be Fairly Taken.

Ottawa, Sept. 14. — Third reading was given to the military voters' bill in the senate this morning, but not before Senator Cloran had made a vigorous attack upon the measure. He declared that the bill was going to pass by a small "packed" majority. Good Liberal members of the senate had been replaced by specially reliable Tories. When the war commenced, he said, an agreement had been reached that vacancies in the House of Commons should be filled if filled at all, by members of the same political faith as the members who had represented the constituency becoming vacant. This had not been observed in regard to the senate. There has been, he said, a flagrant abuse of the truce in this respect.

At this point the Speaker called him to order when he repeated the word "packed." When third reading was moved, Senator Bostock, the opposition leader, said that any criticism of the bill on the Liberal side, had for its sole purpose the improvement of the measure so that the vote of the soldiers could be fairly taken. Chambers for Speaker.

When the senate met, Senator Bostock on the orders of the day brought up the question of Speakers' Chambers in the new parliament buildings, expressing the view that chambers should be provided for the Speakers of both houses.

Senator Sproule, an ex-Speaker of the House of Commons, supported this view. He said that it would be a mistake to depart from the old custom of providing quarters for them in the parliament buildings. Such provision, he said, adds to the dignity of the office.

Senator Edwards said that, while

he was a radical, he believed that a certain dignity should be maintained and favored the long established practice of housing the Speakers in parliament buildings.

Senator Landry, an ex-Speaker of the senate, remarked that as ample provision had been made in the new building for the Speakers, there was no need of departing from an old usage which had proved to be of benefit to both houses.

Senator Daniels suggested that they should pass a resolution in line with the remarks that had been made, while Senator Wilson spoke of the disadvantage of appointing permanent Speakers. Third reading was given to the act respecting livestock.

Separate Schools.

Senator Crosby of Halifax, resumed the deliberation of Senator Landry's questions relative to the separate schools in Ontario.

Senator Sproule denied that any injustice was being done to the French in Ontario by the application of regulation 17. In his opinion the province had the right to direct its own educational system without interference.

Senator Landry who was conciliatory in his remarks said that the French people in Ontario wanted to discuss the bi-lingual question openly and try to devise some satisfactory solution of the problem. They had no objection to circling English. In fact the English language was a necessity to them and they desired to learn it. But they objected to banishing their mother tongue.

The senate adjourned at one o'clock until tomorrow.

## TRAGIC STORY OF AIR COMBAT

Havre, Sept. 14.—A tragic aerial combat took place the afternoon of the 9th above the Belgian trenches along the railway from Nieuport to Dixmude. A British airplane, which had been surrounded by five Germans, fell east of Ramscapele in No Man's Land, with 150 yards separating the lines.

The Germans opened a hot gunfire on the British machine, but several men from a Belgian regiment, determined to lend aid, crawled out in the broad daylight to the aircraft. Both the aviators were found dead.

The Belgians brought in one of the bodies and returned a few hours later for the other. They saw the Germans robbing the dead man, but the Germans fled on the approach of the Belgians. The rapid fire guns resumed shelling the spot, but the Belgians succeeded in bringing back to their trenches the body of the other British aviator.

## BAR SILVER IS COSTLY

New York, Sept. 14. — Bar silver, which, owing to war conditions, has been several months advancing in price, today sold at over \$1 an ounce. It was quoted at 1.005, which is 1 1/2 cents over yesterday's price.

## PROTECTED BY MARINES

Montevideo, Uruguay, Sept. 14. — Uruguayan marines today boarded all the German ships in the harbor here, they having heard of plans to sink the vessels.

The hunting season for all kinds of game opened this morning and there was quite an exodus to the woods. Partridge are reported to be rather scarce this season, but ducks are said to be quite plentiful along the river.

## MAY BE LENIENT WITH KORNILOFF

Washington, D. C., Sept. 14. — General Korniloff's punishment seems one of the points concerned in the formation of a new Russian cabinet. Unofficial reports reaching here today indicated that Premier Kerensky was determined to inflict a heavy penalty as a warning against future uprisings, but certain elements of the constitutional democrats and even many leaders of the council of workmen's and soldiers' delegates, Kerensky's close political friends, advocate leniency.
