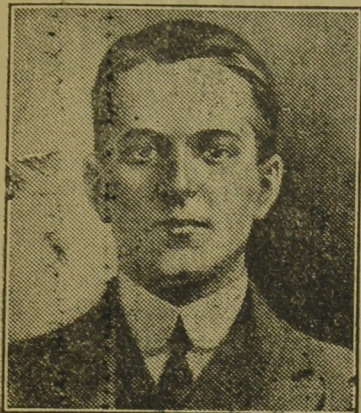

## GET LITTLE HELP FROM TORY PATRONAGE DISPENSERS

Few Jobs in the Gift of the Federal Government go to Returned Soldiers---Mr. Baxter's Gallery Play in the House of Assembly Creates a Lot of Amusement---Some Interesting Correspondence.

The absurd attempt to make it appear that Premier Foster and his supporters are against giving the returned soldiers employment by having Colonel Baxter move an amendment to the address to that effect has been the cause of much fun poking. It was a piece of keenest irony that the Opposition leader should have selected Colonel Baxter to take up the cause of the returned soldier.

There was, of course, much politics in the move. The Federal Conservatives have ignored the returned soldiers so generally in St. John and throughout the province that their local leaders felt that the new Liberal local government might be put in bad if they made it appear that the sheriffs who were not reappointed, and the county court clerks, and the parish court commissioners, and the registrars of deeds, and the road supervisors and the structural superintendents were not replaced by returned soldiers. Returned soldiers are not looking for those kinds of jobs. When there were vacancies in the federal offices suited to returned soldiers, the Tory patronage committee in St. John ignored them.

Thos. Bell is chairman, and Colonel Baxter a member of the returned soldiers' committee, and the good job of secretary is filled by Charles Robinson, who draws \$1,200 a year and expenses. There are many young gentlemen who have fought in the trenches and have returned who could fill that position. The government does not make the appointment. Colonel Baxter and Chairman Bell made it.

There was a rumor that the new Government would appoint a new secretary, though who started it no one seems to know, but because of that rumor Premier Foster had an opportunity to make his position clear to the returned veterans.

### Interesting Correspondence.

The correspondence which follows shows that the president and secretary declared there were no soldiers out of employment, having found jobs for themselves.

St. John, N. B., April 12.  
Hon. W. E. Foster, Premier New Brunswick:

Hon. Sir—Our association, which is composed of officers and men, all of whom have seen service at the front in the present campaign, and numbers 150 members representing the returned soldiers of New Brunswick, beg to draw your attention to the following resolution passed at a meeting of the association on the 12th day of April, 1917.

That rumors of a contemplated change in the returned soldiers' aid commission secretary, now held by Chas. Robinson, having been brought to the notice of the association, this meeting is unanimously in favor of C. Robinson retaining the office he now holds, as he has always given satisfaction in positions in civil life on discharge. We having no members at present out of employment, which shows a favorable recommendation to his ability, and we as the representative of the returned soldiers of the province of New Brunswick do not wish any change made in the office referred to, and knowing your feelings towards the soldier in general we feel you will use your endeavors to stay any change contemplated in the returned soldiers' aid commission of New Brunswick in St. John, N. B. Thanking you in anticipation of your favorable reply, we remain yours truly for the association.

Bud Tippet, President European War Veterans' Association, 38 Charlotte Street, St. John:

Dear Sir—I beg to acknowledge yours of April 12 and to note the resolution of your association respecting the position of secretary to the returned soldiers' aid commission. It also gives me much pleasure to note that there are no members of your association, which I presume all who have returned from the front, at present out of employment. So far as I know there have been no applications for the position of secretary now held by Chas. Robinson. As a matter of fact the appointment of Mr. Robinson is not made by the government, but by the committee for which he acts as secretary, and the sum of \$2,000 was given in 1916 for this purpose and also paid in the early part of the fiscal year. However, it will be the policy of the government so far as it is possible to fill any positions with those who have served Canada and their empire in the present war, and I am quite sure that your association will join with us in that view provided a returned soldier of sufficient ability has need of any responsible position.

Hon. Sir—Our association, which is represented by somewhere around 7,000 members in Canada at present, wish to draw to your notice the fact that in recommending to the Provincial Government the names for inspectors under the Prohibition Act so far not one returned soldier has been named by the Rev. Mr. Wilson for the positions. And we wish to state that we have been quite capable of performing the duties required and beg you to see that the returned

soldier gets first consideration for the positions of liquor inspectors for New Brunswick. Thanking you in anticipation of your favor,

Dear Sir—I beg to acknowledge receipt of yours of April 30 with respect to the fact that the chief inspector under the Prohibition Act has not named one returned soldier for the position of sub-inspector. I am very much obliged to you for keeping always in mind the claims of the returned soldiers upon us. At the same time I feel sure that you will not blame us for thinking that there was no need of present employment among your veterans because of the letter which you sent me on April 12. I am enclosing you a copy of my reply at that time, the principles of which the Government is still willing to stand by. I sincerely hope that there is no lack of employment for the members of your association who are capable of doing work.

In view of the above correspondence the plea for the returned soldier made by Colonel Baxter and his friends will not make many friends among those who have been treated so shabbily in many ways by the Federal Government.

Even while the amendment which had it carried would have meant the defeat of the Government, twelve returned soldiers were on guard around parliament buildings employed by the new minister of public works.

## PEOPLE PAID FOR CAMPAIGN LITERATURE

Hon. Mr. Foster in reply to Dr. Hetherington's inquiry in the House Friday said:

1. Was the printing of an address to "the Electors of the Province" during the campaign signed by B. F. Smith paid for out of Provincial funds? If so, what amount was paid?

Ans. The printing of the new Highway policy of Provincial Government announced to the people of New Brunswick by Hon. B. F. Smith, in circular form, was paid for out of Provincial funds. The amount so paid was \$295 upon the approval of B. F. Smith and the King's Printer.

2. Did the Standard newspaper of St. John publish the same address with the addition of the words "Vote for Smith, Sutton and White" and afterwards send an account to the Province for the advertisement?

Ans. Yes. In the Standard newspaper.

3. Was this account approved of and if so by whom?

Ans. The account was approved by B. F. Smith, but not paid.

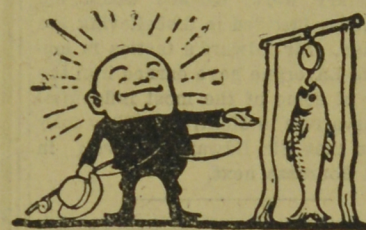

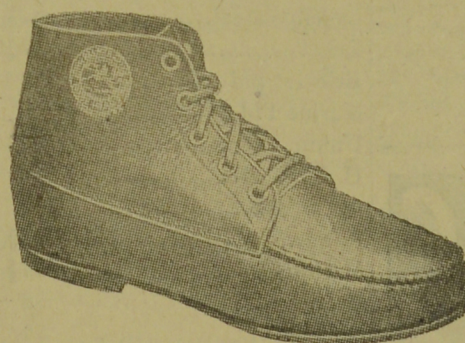
