Death at Marysville. Charlotte M. Peterson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Peterson, Marysville, died Sunday morning aged five years and nine months. Death was caused by pneumonia. The parents, one brother, and two sisters survive. The funeral will take place at 2.30 on Tuesday afternoon. Rev. E. J. Barrass will conduct the service. Interment will be made at the Baptist cemetery, Marysville.

Row in the Black Hills. There was trouble in the Black Hills last night, said to have resulted from over-indulgence in election boogie distributed at the Gibson poll by Government workers. A colored gentleman called upon a colored lady. The colored gentleman's wife objected and to force her spouse to return home she broke all the windows in the other lady's house. The landlady objected to the whole proceedings and everybody concerned visited the police magistrate this morning. His Honor let them go on condition that the damage was made good.

Mr. Mr. Daggett's Case. The case of Mr. J. B. Daggett, the partizan Secretary of Agriculture, is causing some amusement in political circles about the city. In a political speech at the Sunbury convention he said: "Let me say that the Opposition will have no more right to dismiss me on the morning of February 25th than they have today. If by a miracle they should come into power, they would not have the privilege of dismissing me. I would resign and walk out with my friends." It would appear from this that the resignation is nearly due.

Believed Killed in Action. The name of John F. Dolan, Fredericton, appears in the casualty list today as believed killed in action. Private Dolan was with the 6th Mounted Rifles. Last summer, when that corps met with heavy casualties, he was announced to be missing. Since that time he was believed to be a prisoner in Germany, although letters from men who had been taken prisoner stated that he had been killed in action. The casualty list now appears to confirm that report. He was a son of Mr. and Mrs. James Dolan of this city, and a brother of Mr. D. Leo Dolan and Mrs. E. G. Colby.

Ex-Premier Clarke Died This Afternoon

A despatch from St. Stephen states that Hon. George J. Clarke, ex-Premier, passed away at his home at 2.30 o'clock today. He was a lawyer by profession and had been a member of the Legislature since 1903. He was appointed Attorney General in 1913 and Premier in 1914, resigning in January of this year.

FRANK SMITH SENT TO INDUSTRIAL HOME ON TWO YEARS' TERM

Alex. Thompson Further Remanded---Magistrate Strongly Criticizes Conditions at County Jail---Boys Both in Vermincus State

Frank Smith, of this city, was sentenced to two years in the Boys' Industrial Home this morning by Police Magistrate Limerick. The sentence was for a break and robbery at the drug store of Alonzo Staples early in January. Alex. Thompson, who is held for the same offence, was further remanded.

When the two boys were brought from the county jail this morning the police found that their bodies were infested with vermin. To avoid the danger of making the cells verminous, the boys were kept in the guard room and were not taken into the court room for hearing.

At the request of the Magistrate, Mayor Mitchell and Ald. Walker, chairman of the Administration of Justice Committee, were present at the hearing. His Honor made some caustic reference to conditions at the jail when prisoners were allowed to get in such a state. Young Smith's statement that adult prisoners had been placed in the same cell with him on two occasions, caused the Magistrate to say that the Dominion Statutes distinctly forbade adult prisoners being placed with juveniles.

GR. C. ROBT. HAWKINS GIVEN LIEUTENANT'S COMMISSION IN FRANCE

Has Gone to England to Qualify For Rank---Left Fredericton in 1915 With the 28th Field Battery.

Mr. G. N. C. Hawkins, manager of the local branch of the Bank of Montreal, received a cablegram yesterday from his son, Gunner C. Robert Hawkins, who is now at Folkestone, Eng. The cablegram announces that Gunner Hawkins has been granted a commission as lieutenant in the field artillery and will qualify for his rank in England.

Lieut. Hawkins left Fredericton in the summer of 1915 with the 28th Field Battery, which was raised here with Major Randolph Crocket as officer commanding. He served in France for several months and refused to take stripes when they were offered him. He is a graduate in arts of Dalhousie University, and a student at law. His brother, Raeburn Hawkins, is in the 9th Siege Battery, raised at St. John last autumn and during the present winter.
