**MENTAL DEFECTIVES SHOULD BE SHUT OUT OF CANADA**

**Important Papers Read at the Meeting of the Public Health Association at Ottawa ---Dr. Hattie of Halifax Deals with Medical Problems Arising out of the War---Tubercular Recruits are Expensive.**

Ottawa, Sept. 29.—That it was time Canada was waking up and put the ban on mental defectives entering the country to enjoy the full rights of citizenship was the main point in one of the several admirable papers presented at the closing session of the sixth annual congress of the Canadian Public Health Association yesterday afternoon.

Captain W. H. Hattie, M. D., Halifax, Provincial Health Officer of Nova Scotia, submitted one of the finest papers of the congress on "Some Medical-sociological Problems Arising Out of the War," in which he called attention to the death or disablement in the war of the men best fitted to father a vigorous and virile generation and the serious effect of the will on the birthrate of Canada and the stock quality of the next generation.

Captain Hattie pointed out the terrible toll of young Canadian manhood taken by the war and he referred to

the seriousness of the problem of replacing these precious lives in a country so badly needing population. He referred with satisfaction to the fact that the war had not adversely affected the birthrates of Canada or the gradually receding infant mortality rate.

**Crime not Increasing.**

Captain Hattie called attention to the fact that there was some uneasiness caused by the impression that there had been an increase in crime and delinquency since the outbreak of the war. By quoting figures he showed that this was not true, except in a few instances. It is impossible to believe otherwise than that the sentiment in favor of restricting the manufacture and sale of intoxicants, which has so greatly been strengthened by the war, will increase rather than lessen after peace is declared.

Captain Hattie referred to the men as England and the British dominions are dealing with the great white plague. One of his most interesting statements was that every tubercular man entering the Canadian army was costing the country from \$1,200 to \$1,300 a year.
