## Sporting News

### JUDGES FINED DRIVER LEE ON GRAND CIRCUIT

Drove Doris Watts Seven Heats Before Winning 2.13 Trot at Columbus—Charges Dropped.

Columbus, O., Sept. 28. — Columbus Grand Circuit meeting came to a close this afternoon when the seventh and deciding heat of the 2.13 trot was raced on a track a little slow because of a night rain. Judges who had taken charge of Doris Watts after her six heat suspicious drive of Thursday placed C. L. Floyd behind her today instead of Guy Lee and she won the race. The time of the mile was 2.11½. At the conclusion of the race the judges fined Driver Lee \$100 for not trying to win. Owner George Slaughter of Detroit, also was fined \$100 for collusion while C. L. Floyd was awarded \$100 out of Doris Watts' winnings for driving the final heat.

Not sufficient evidence was found to merit any punishment for Driver Al Stout in the 2.15 trot of Wednesday when he did not win with Lotto Watts and the charges against him were dropped.

Chicago, Sept. 28. — Try this on your adding machine: Orders for 100,000 seats for each game of the world's series at Comiskey Park had been received today.

There are 33,000 seats. Thousands of out of town applicants will be disappointed, as the White Sox management has announced that the home grown fans will be "taken care of first."

The one ray of hope remaining for the tardy ones is the fact that 15,000 pavilion and bleacher seats will be placed on sale at the park in the morning before each game.

According to the National Commission "there ain't no such animal" as the ticket scalper. But—brokers are offering \$2.50 for \$1.50 reserved seats and \$7.50 for \$5 box seats.

### TORONTO WON SECOND GAME

Toronto, Sept. 26. — Toronto, champions of the International league, defeated Indianapolis, American Association champions, 4 to 0, in the second of the post-season series here today. Each team has now won one game. Only 29 visiting batsmen faced Gould and only one man reached second base.

### MANSLAUGHTER CASE AT HULL

Ottawa, Sept. 28. — The coroner's jury inquiring into the death of Joseph Arthur Ouellette in Hull last Tuesday, last night returned a verdict of manslaughter against Thomas Desmarais, proprietor of the Montreal Hotel, in Hull, Que.

Ouellette, said to have been drunk, tried to enter the bar of Desmarais' hotel after he had been expelled therefrom. In the tussle with Desmarais, Ouellette was thrown down on the sidewalk, dying shortly afterwards from the injuries he sustained.

### CICOTTE SAYS SHINE BALL IS A PURE MYTH

Merely the Old Knuckle Ball with Variations—Says He Had All the Big Batters Bluffed.

Chicago, Sept. 27. — "The shine ball is a myth," said Eddie Cicotte today.

"It was merely a matter of psychology. I out-guessed the other fellow. So long as the batters in the league felt that they were batting against something they knew nothing about I had an advantage.

"If you can bluff a fellow into believing you are more than he is you have him 'licked' from the start. That is really the success of the so-called 'shine ball'."

"So long as Speaker, Chapman, Baker, Pipp and other heavy batters of the league thought I was feeding them something 'phony' I had something on them."

"I have been accused of everything but murder this year. My uniform has been stolen from the clubhouse on several occasions. The shine ball is simply the old knuckle ball with variations."

### JACOBSON HIT THE BALL HARD

Jacobson, the young outfielder formerly in the New Brunswick & Maine League, and now with Toronto in the International, is hitting the ball hard. In the first game of the series between Toronto and Indianapolis, the American Association champs, he hit safely four times for a total of six bases.
