The police are busy looking up persons who have not paid their dog licenses and are getting ready to lay complaints against those persons who are owners of dogs and who have not taken out licenses. The fee now is \$2 per animal, being doubled by non-payment before a certain date.

Has Made Good in Cuba.

Mr. Fred P. Dever, son of the late Patrick Dever of Fredericton, is now superintendent of the branches of the Royal Bank of Canada in the West Indies. He is located in Cuba where he has resided for the past ten years. Mr. Dever while a clerk in the employ of the Royal Bank was stationed in Fredericton, St. John and Woodstock.

Want Cars Handled Rapidly.

The Canadian Pacific Railway has issued a circular calling the attention of the public to the fact that the demand for freight cars exceeds the supply and that war conditions will aggravate the situation. In view of this better loading of cars is urged. Loading to full capacity or to 110 per cent. when practicable is suggested as a means of meeting car shortage. Prompt loading and unloading of cars also is urged.

Sent to Children's Home.

Eight small boys appeared this morning in the police court before Magistrate Limerick charged with loitering around the moving picture theatres on Carleton street at night and fooling with the motor cars standing outside. Four of the boys were sent to the Children's Aid Home, Woodstock Road, for the present, and the other four were allowed to go to the homes of their parents with the understanding that they must have better conduct.

Week-end Market.

The market this morning was fairly large and a variety of produce was offered. The prices quoted are as follows: Lamb, \$1 to \$1.50; apples, \$2.50 a barrel; potatoes \$2.75 a barrel; furnace wood, 4 ft. lengths, \$6 a load; live fowl, \$1 a pair; butter, 45 cents a pound; eggs 50 cents a dozen; turkeys 50 cents a half barrel; live pigs \$3; bees' honey by the comb, 20 green corn 25 cents a dozen; mutt-green corn 25 cents a dozen; mutt-ton, 10 to 12 cents per lb.; beets, carrots, 5 cents per bunch; squash, 2 cents per lb.

**R. N. WINSLOW OF
FREDERICTON IN
U. S. ENGINEERS**

U. N. B. Graduate Who Had
Located in Western States
---A Brother Died in
France.

Among former Canadians who are serving in the United States army the republic being the land of their adoption, is Lieut. Robert N. Winslow of Fredericton. Lieut. Winslow is now at Battle Creek, Mich., in barracks with the 310th Engineers. The unit formerly was stationed at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas.

Lieut. Winslow is a son of the late E. B. Winslow of Fredericton and was graduated by the U.N.B. in civil engineering in 1906. Shortly after graduation he located in the Western States and after residing there for some time became an American citizen.

The eldest brother of Lieut. Winslow, the late Lieut. Jasper A. Winslow, died of illness in France while serving with the Canadian Field Artillery. Major Rainford H. Winslow, another brother, is serving in France now with a Canadian pioneer battalion. Mr. J. J. F. Winslow of this city, also is a brother.

236th For Montreal.

That all the military camps throughout Canada are to be broken up by October 6, is the information received at the office of the New Brunswick command. On the breaking up of Valcartier camp during the next few days, the 236th Battalion, MacLean Kilties, it is understood, will be sent to Montreal, probably to spend a few more months in training. This is not definite, but is the opinion of military officials.
