THE PREMIER OF ALBERTA IN THE EAST

Hon. A. L. Sifton and Hon. C. R. Mitchell in St. John on Monday, en route to Halifax.

St. John, Oct. 1.—Hon. Arthur L. Sifton, Premier of Alberta, was in the city yesterday. He was accompanied by Hon. C. R. Mitchell, provincial treasurer in the Alberta government. Mr. Mitchell is on a private business trip and Premier Sifton came east for the purpose of seeing the country. He said yesterday that his visit has no political significance whatever.

Regarding the reports that he might join Sir Robert Borden in some form of coalition government, Premier Sifton said: "I do not know anything about the matter." Referring to the coming political contest, he said: "The result of the elections in the west will depend entirely upon the composition of the government that appeals to the country. I do not care to enlarge upon this statement. In fact, I am saying more now than I have yet said on the subject."

"The west is in a prosperous condition, and the general grain crop is very heavy and of a high grade. The millers are kicking because they have to grade everything No. 1 and they have no chance of making a big profit."


The total value of the western crop will run from five to six hundred million dollars in all grades, it is estimated by some experts, said Hon. Mr. Mitchell, and he added to this statement the information that one farmer, C. S. Noble, of Noblesford, Alta., would this year raise 300,000 bushels of wheat on a 9,000 acre farm. This man, he said, was "broke" three years ago.

Hon. Mr. Mitchell is a former New-castle boy and a nephew of the late Hon. Peter Mitchell. He was graduated from the University of New Brunswick and after practising law for a time in his native town, went west in 1898. He was for a time district court judge in Alberta, but resigned from the bench to go into politics.

Messrs. Sifton and Mitchell went to Halifax on the late train last night.

Premier Foster entertained Premier Sifton and Hon. Mr. Mitchell at dinner at the Union Club last night, together with a small party of other guests, including Hon. William Pugsley.

Premier Sifton took a drive about the city yesterday afternoon and was much impressed with his first visit to St. John. Hon. Mr. Mitchell met many old friends during his stay in the city.


