CANADIANS IN FRANCE WILL GET BULLETINS

Chicago Tribune Will Send Service on World's Series Games—Many Soldiers Are Interested.

Toronto, Oct. 1. — Canadian troops will share in the Chicago Tribune special cable service to the American troops at the front of the world's series baseball games. This was assured in a letter received by Mayor Church from President Ban Johnson of the American League. The Tribune's plan is to send the box score and a detailed account of each game to the boys in France immediately after each game, and at the request of Mayor Church, Harvey Woodruff, sporting editor of that paper, has cabled their representatives in France to be sure the Canadians get the story as well as the Americans.

COMISKEY AFTER TICKET SCALPERS

Chicago, Sept. 28. — A new drive against scalpers of World's Series tickets was launched tonight by Chas. A. Comiskey, president of the Chicago Americans.

He established a special department at the White Sox baseball park, had telephones installed and issued an appeal requesting the public to communicate any information at hand regarding persons attempting to obtain tickets through mail orders with the intention of having them resold at fabulous prices by the ticket scalpers.

"I am earnestly endeavoring to eliminate the scalping of tickets," Mr. Comiskey said, "and I am seeking the co-operation of the public in this. It is an unnecessary evil and should be done away with. Any information regarding scalping will be acted on immediately."

The scalpers are defiant, even in the face of the stand taken by Comiskey and State's Attorney Maclay Hayne, who has threatened prosecution on charges of conspiracy to extort. The scalpers insist they will be able to fill any reasonable order for tickets and declare there is no legal way to stop them.

"If a holder of a World's Series ticket finds he is unable to attend the game and wants to sell his ticket to me, I'd like to know how he can be prevented," said one.

"These tickets become public property as soon as they are passed out."

CHICAGO CUBS BUY CATCHER

Chicago, Sept. 28. — Thomas D. Daly, catcher of the Buffalo club of the International league, today was purchased by the Chicago Nationals, and will come here to finish the season with the locals. Daly was a member of the Chicago Americans in 1914 and 1915 and went to Cleveland in a trade.

BEZDEK AGAIN PIRATE MANAGER

Pittsburg, Pa., Sept. 28. — Hugo Bezdek, who succeeded James Callahan as manager of the Pittsburg Nationals several months ago, has signed a contract to manage the club next season. It was announced tonight by President Barney Dreyfus. Bezdek leaves tomorrow to take up his work as coach of the University of Oregon football squad.

NELLA DILLON WON KENTUCKY FUTURITY, \$5,000

Equalled Peter Volo's Record — Busy's Lassie Beaten by Early Dreams in the 2.11 Trot.

Lexington, Oct. 1. — Alexander B. Cox's bay filly Nella Dillon, driven by Joseph Serrill, won the twenty-fourth renewal of the \$5,000 two-year-old Kentucky futurity today in spectacular style. She equalled the world's record for two heats by a two-year-old trotter of Peter Volo, made at Columbus O., in 1913. She also in each heat lowered the sesano's record by trotting in 2.07 and 2.06 1/4. Peter June, the favorite, driven by Geers, was second in each heat but beaten decisively. Serrill lay in behind until the stretch when he pulled out and passed Peter June with ease. The Walnut Hall cup \$3,000 event was won in straight heats by Early Dreams. In the first heat he was forced to equal the track record of 2.04 1/4.

In the first heat Early Dreams, Alma Forbes, Ima Jay and Busy's Lassie finished heads apart.

Baxter Lou won the 2.07 pace after losing the first heat to Barlight in 2.04 1/4.

The 2.14 pace was unfinished with George E. Hutton and Bingen Direct each with a heat to their credit. Summaries:
