

BERNSTORFF MAY SEEK REFUGE IN MEXICO

Not Much Chance for Him to Get
Safe Conduct to Germany.

New York, Feb. 3.—A well-defined rumor ascribed to official circles has given rise to an apprehension that in the event of the German ambassador being handed his passports, that official will make straightway for either Cuba or Mexico, with the chances favoring the latter country, according to the Herald this morning.

It is unbelievable, it is declared, that the Allied powers will undertake to grant the German embassy safe conduct to Germany, and, short of South America, the nearest neutral country would be Cuba or Mexico.

Cuba, because of close connections with the United States, is hardly regarded as offering the freedom of expression or action that would be afforded by Mexico, and there is strong reason for believing that the German representatives would be welcome in the latter country.

TEN OF THE CREW MET A WATERY GRAVE

London, Feb. 3.—Ten members of the crew of the British steamer Essonite, previously reported sunk, were drowned, Lloyd's shipping agency announced today. The captain and two men of the crew have been landed.

The Dutch steamer Gamm, 2,198 tons gross, is reported sunk, the shipping agency announces. The sinking of the Essonite was announced by Lloyds on February 2.

AN ARBITRARY AND PIRATICAL ACT

Petrograd, via London, Feb. 3.—The Russian government views Germany's blockade announcement as an "arbitrary and piratical act," an expression obtained from the foreign office today which is to the effect that inasmuch as Germany's fleet is bottled up, her only means for enforcing the blockade is the use of submarines.

The nature of these craft and their inability to take off crews and passengers of vessels, it was stated, made the use of submarines a violation of all principles of international law.

AN EXPLOSION ON RUSSIAN ICE BREAKER

Petrograd, Feb. 3.—An explosion occurred on board the ice breaker Tschelouskine while the vessel was unloading at Archangel, according to an official announcement issued today.

It is feared that about 30 persons lost their lives; 344 persons were injured, 53 of them seriously.

Douglas Hoben, son of ex-Ald. Enoch G. Hoben, died on Saturday evening at the age of 23 years of heart failure. The deceased had been in a critical state of health for some time, and though his illness was known to be fatal, no serious symptoms developed until late Saturday afternoon. About two years ago the young man spent a winter in Florida in an endeavor to regain his health, but apparently without permanent benefit. He is survived by his father, his stepmother and a half-brother, Arthur Hoben. The funeral will take place at 2:30 p.m. today afternoon at the residence, George street. Service will be conducted by Rev. Dr. Kierstead, assisted by Rev. J. E. Wilson. Interment will be made at the Rural Cemetery.

Lloyd Colwell.

Lloyd Colwell, of Cross Creek, died at Victoria Public Hospital at noon Saturday, at the age of 26 years. The remains were taken to Cross Creek Saturday night by C. G. R. express.

Patrick Marlowe.

The remains of the late Patrick Marlowe, whose death occurred at Jamaica Plains, Mass., arrived here at noon today. Solemn service was conducted at St. Dunstan's Church by Rev. Father Carney and interment was made at the Hermitage.

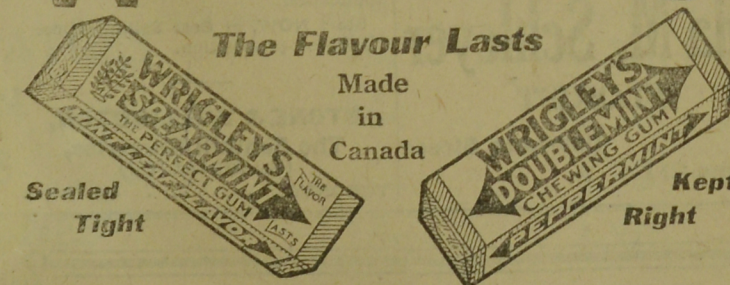
