### GOVERNMENT PARTY WANT MR. J. M. SCOTT

nxious Now to Make Amends for  
Scurvy Treatment Given Him Two  
Years Ago.

The so-called Government executive, which consists of Mr. Pinder, Dr. Morehouse and several government contractors and office holders, had a busy time of it here on Saturday. They met in secret conclave early in the afternoon, and after talking over the situation started in to select candidates. Mr. James M. Scott, who ran as an independent in a by-election in 1914, and made a gallant fight against the Local Government machine and a big boodle fund, plus the proceeds of the now celebrated \$5,000 note, was the unanimous choice. A delegation possessed of considerable nerve was delegated to wait on Mr. Scott and put the matter squarely up to him. They found Mr. Scott and were most profuse in promises and apologies. They assured him that he could have most anything he wanted if he would only consent to be a candidate and thus help them out of a hole. Mr. Scott was sympathetic and refrained from saying some of the things which he would have been justified in saying; but finally promised to give the matter consideration. The delegation was not satisfied with his reply, but there was nothing to do but accept it.

Mr. Scott should feel gratified to think that men who only two years ago stole an election from him are now almost willing to lie down on the floor and let him walk over them. Time has certainly vindicated him in the stand he took in 1914.

The Local Government party will meet in conclave on Thursday to select candidates. Contrary to the usual custom, the convention was not called by the president of the Conservative Association, but by Mr. C. D. Richards, who was recently appointed registrar of probates at a salary of \$500 per year. A great gathering of office holders, road supervisors and structural superintendents is expected.

#### Will Pinder Run?

The latest report in Government circles is that Mr. Pinder has been promised the Federal nomination for York and Sunbury and will not offer for re-election as a candidate on the Government ticket. Mr. Frank Brooks, of Southampton, has been promised a place on the ticket in case Mr. Pinder can be persuaded to stand aside. It is said that Premier Murray feels that the Government would be "embarrassed" if Mr. Pinder were to offer for re-election, and he is anxious to have the old man drop out. In case Mr. Pinder allows himself to be gold-bricked with the promise of the Federal nomination, Mr. Young may again bob up as a candidate, providing Dr. Morehouse does not put up too big a kick. Hon. A. R. Slipp, the new Minister of Lands and Mines, has entered upon his duties as a "pacifier." He is so busy on the job that he will be unable to visit his "native county of Queens" before the latter part of the week.

### OPPOSITION CAMPAIGN IS WARMING UP

Riverside, Feb. 4.—A convention of Albert county electors opposed to the present administration at Fredericton it is announced, will be held at Riverside on Thursday next, February 8th, at 3 o'clock in the afternoon, for the purpose of selecting candidates to contest the county in the coming provincial election.

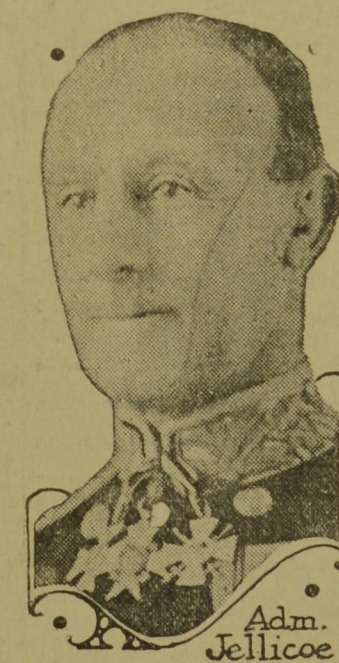

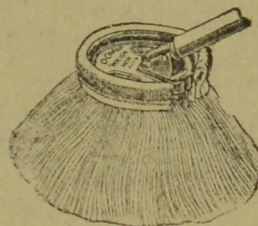
