



Government House Ready.

Government House Ready. Capt. J. D. Black, quartermaster of the 236th Highlanders, states that the work of fitting up Old Government House for occupation by the troops is about completed. Within a few days the building will be ready. Accommo-dations for 365 men have been pro-vided. When all the men enlisted for the 236th have been called to head-quarters there will be more than can be quartered at the Exhibition Bar-racks. The cost has been \$2,000. The city voted \$3,500 for the work. It is said that \$1,500 per day is being ex-pended for the pay and maintenance of the troops now here.
