### RESIDENCE DAMAGED BY FIRE LAST NIGHT

Dwelling of Mrs. Charles N. Clark,  
Brunswick Street, Partially Burned  
---Loss Covered by Insurance

The residence at 531 Brunswick street, owned by Mrs. Charles N. Clark and occupied by the owner and Mrs. Strong, was damaged by fire last night. The fire was confined to the rear of the building, damage in the main house being done by smoke and water. Part of the roof of the L of the house was burned off and the interior badly damaged by fire, smoke and water.

The fire originated in the rear of the house and had much headway when discovered by a passer-by. An alarm was rung in from box 35, at the corner of Carleton and Brunswick streets, but the box failed to operate properly. The firemen were then summoned by telephone. Later an alarm was rung in from box 38 at the corner of King and Regent streets. The confusion in the alarm delayed the firemen, but the blaze was soon under control.

The house was insured in the British American Company, represented locally by Mr. W. S. Hooper. The loss is roughly estimated at several hundred dollars.

### RED CROSS WORK IN FREDERICTON

Interesting Letter on an Important  
Subject From the Countess  
Of Ashburnham.

To the Editor of the Daily Mail.

Sir,—Until now Fredericton has been the only city of any consequence in Canada that has not had a branch of the Red Cross Society. The Ashburnham Club, which was instituted by Miss Anderson in 1913, and which since the outbreak of the war has done so much good work for the soldiers, is now recognized at Ottawa as the Ashburnham branch of the Red Cross Society in Fredericton.

The necessary charter had to be sent to England to be signed by H. R. H. the Duchess of Connaught, and as soon as it is received here a meeting will be called to organize the branch, which meeting will be addressed by Lady Tilley and others interested in the subject.

I will explain briefly the object of the Red Cross Society. It is to furnish aid to the sick and wounded in the war. That is all. It is purely naval and military in its object and does not interfere with any other charity.

The Red Cross Society, as is well known, was the result of the work of one energetic man, Mons. Henri Dunant, in 1859, and under the Geneva Convention it made such wonderful progress that up to 1914 it was supposed that the flag showing the Geneva Red Cross would be respected by every civilized nation in the world.

Unfortunately, events in 1914 and following years have shown us that there is one nation that does not respect it, and it is to furnish aid to the sick and wounded in the present terrible war against that nation that the people of Fredericton are going to be asked to support the Red Cross.

### DOMINION ALLIANCE BRANCH EXECUTIVE IN SESSION

Returns Not Yet Secured From all  
Agents---Circulating Petitions for  
Repeal of C. T. A.

The executive of the New Brunswick branch of the Dominion Alliance met here yesterday and considered various matters connected with temperance matters. It was stated this morning that there was nothing to announce to the public at the present time, and that there would probably be another meeting shortly.

Nothing has been determined yet concerning the election for the repeal of the Canada Temperance Act in this city. Returns from all the agents securing signatures to the petition for repeal have not been received.

It is understood that the opinion was expressed at yesterday's meeting that temperance people need feel no apprehension concerning the Prohibition Act, which is to go into effect on May 1st.

### Fresh Arrests On Gerlach Case

Paris, March 10.—A number of fresh arrests have been made in Rome in connection with what is known as the Gerlach case, according to a Milan despatch to the Matin. The names of the accused will not be made public until the trial, which will be a secret one.

Monsignor Von Gerlach, an Austrian, was private chamberlain to the Pope. He was forced to leave Rome in January through pressure brought to bear on the Vatican, according to a semi-official despatch from Berlin by the representatives of the Entente.

Prior to his departure an Italian named Ambrogetti, who claimed to be Monsignor Gerlach's financial agent, was arrested charged with being implicated in the blowing up of the Italian battleships Benedetto Brin and Leonardo La Vinci. Monsignor Gerlach was the only Teutonic prelate in the Pope's retinue.

Cornwall, Ont., March 10.—The body of Wm. St. Pierre, a farmer residing at Aultsville, near here, was found yesterday buried in the cellar of his home. The man had been missing for several days and search by the provincial police resulted in finding the body with two bullet wounds in the throat.

Detective Miller claims that Miss Nellie Richmire, aged 17, acknowledged to him that she had shot St. Pierre on March 7. The girl had been living with the dead man's son and states that while alone in the house St. Pierre senior attempted to assault her, and that she shot him first with a revolver and afterwards with a shotgun.

Both the girl and the son of the dead man are held by the police.
