**The Peril

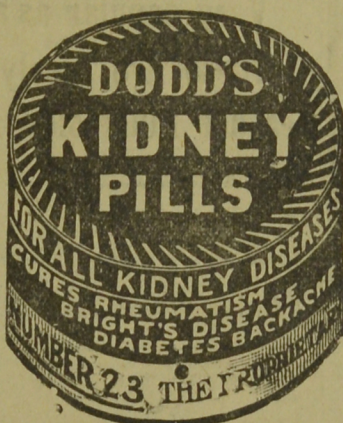
