

## OF INTEREST TO WOMEN.

THROUGH THE MEAT CHOPPER.

More Knowledge Required Than is to be Found in Recipe Books.

No one could justly be called a good all round housewife or cook who did not understand the art of using meat the second time. And to become thus efficient one should do more than have access to a recipe book, where one may find rules for making various sorts of hash, pies and croquettes.

One should really analyze the principles that underlie this branch of food cookery. With these principles well understood, one can apply them to the particular problem in hand.

For instance, when meat is in small scraps and perhaps a little dried and browned in places, it should be ground and if it is in better condition it should be fine cut, and if it is in very good condition it should be coarse cut.

From the ground meat one makes croquettes, loaves, fine hashes and meat cakes. From the cut meat should be made scalloped dishes, timbales and cream dishes, and from coarse cut meat pies and stews.

### Meat Pie.

Frequently from one left over roast considerable variety can be produced by cutting it from the bones and sorting the different parts according to their suitability for these three treatments. For dinner a meat pie may be made from the coarse cut part. A breakfast hash may be made from the ground portions and for luncheon or dinner, timbales or a scalloped dish can be prepared.

In making pies do not limit yourself to pie crust cover. Biscuit dough or mashed potatoes may be used.

Bread crumbs moistened with milk

and one egg make a delicious pie cover.

### Scalloped Dishes.

In making scalloped dishes do not always use bread crumbs. Rice, macaroni or noodles should be used by way of variety.

One important thing to remember in making made-over dishes, especially in summer, is this: Although the meat may have been cooked once, it should be thoroughly cooked the second time. It is said that more cases of ptomaine poisoning are due to the fact that croquettes and other made-over dishes are not cooked thoroughly the second time, than to any other cause.

## WANTS CASE TO GO TO THE COMMITTEE ON PRIVILEGES

Mr. Baxter Worried Over the Status of Two Members of the The Legislature--- Explanations by the Hon. Mr. Murray and Mr. Dysart---Albert County Member Also Holds Petty Office Under the Government.

In the Legislative Assembly on Friday Hon. Mr. Foster said that the ex-Attorney General had raised a question regarding the qualifications of two Hon. members of the House. He was anxious that every Hon. Member should comply with the law, but he did not feel that in this case the Hon. Gentlemen complained of were disqualified. As they were both present no doubt they would have something to say on the matter.

Hon. Mr. Murray (Northumberland) said he regretted that during his absence a question had been raised in regard to his qualifications as a member of the House. He felt that he had kept within the law and was fully entitled to a seat in the House. For many years under the old act he had held the office of referee in equity for Northumberland County. In 1906 he was nominated for the Legislature but before accepting had conferred with Hon. Mr. Tweedie, the then Premier, in regard to resigning his office. Hon. Mr. Tweedie had expressed the opinion that it was unnecessary for him to resign and subsequently that opinion was endorsed by Hon. Mr. Pugsley, then Attorney General. He (Murray) was elected and took his seat in the House and no question was raised in regard to his qualification. The law had since been changed, but he did not think it altered his position, as a Master of the Supreme Court is the same as a referee in equity under the old act. He had received no fees from the Government therefore he did not think that his office was one of emolument.

### Mr. Dysart's View

Mr. Dysart said that his right to hold a seat in the Legislature had been questioned. The act stipulated that no person holding an office of emolument under the Government was qualified to sit in the Legislature. He thought that before one came within the scope of the act it must be shown that he was in receipt of a salary or fees from his office. He had been appointed by the late Government a police and stipendiary magistrate for Kent, but had immediately resigned. He was subsequently appointed a Parish Court Commissioner, but had never acted nor had he ever received one cent directly or indirectly from the office. He could say further that he had never taken the oath of office, or signed the roll. The Standard had referred to him as being on the Government pay roll, which statement was absolutely false. He had no desire to hold a seat in the House unless he was qualified, and if he thought there was anything in the Ex-Attorney General's contention he would resign. He held that if a man, who had been appointed a Parish Court Commissioner and had never acted was disqualified it would be an easy matter for the Government to disqualify any number of Hon. Members by giving them such an appointment. While on the subject he would call the attention to the fact

that an Hon. Member for Albert was in January, 1909, appointed a Commissioner for taking affidavits for bail, and there was no record of his having resigned.

Mr. Baxter said that notwithstanding the statements, which had been made to the House, he thought that some action should be taken. So far as the Hon. Member for Kent was concerned, if what he said was true, and he did not doubt his statement, any investigation that might be made by the Privileges Committee could not affect him. He (Baxter) was a Member of the Committee, and would have no hesitation in signing a report exonerating him. As to the Hon. Provincial Secretary Treasurer his case was different, as he had acted and had been paid fees. He gave notice that on Thursday next he would move seconded by Mr. Murray (Kings) that the matter be referred to the Committee on Privileges.
