Week End Market.
Notwithstanding the inclement weather there was an exceptionally large market this morning for the time of year. Potatoes were very plentiful and the demand was very keen at from \$7 to \$8 per barrel; butter from 38 cents to 40 cents per pound and eggs were rather scarce at 25 cents, veal was plentiful at 10 and 12 cents per pound and pork brought 20 cents, small live pigs sold at \$4.75 each and rhubarb for 10 cents per bunch and radishes 10 cents per bunch.

Helping the Kilties.
Mr. William J. Robinson, a former New Brunswicker, now on the staff of the Boston Globe, is rendering splendid assistance to the Kilties in their campaign for recruits in Boston. Mr. Robinson, who is a grandson of Capt. J. A. Read, of this city, served in France for thirteen months with the British Army Service Corps. Upon his return to Boston he engaged in newspaper work on the staff of the Globe. He has written several books on the war and has contributed many articles to American magazines in support of the cause of the Allies. An article from his pen on the work of the Kilties in France appears in another part of this issue.

Unqualified Lieutenants.
Orders have been issued to Major Wilson of No. 4 Military District, with headquarters at Montreal, to the effect that all unqualified lieutenants in the active militia of Canada be asked to resign their commissions. The order does not affect the higher ranks or officers now taking qualifying courses. It is probable that the same order will be issued in all military districts. It is estimated that there are more than three thousand unqualified lieutenants in the Canadian militia. It is considered that these officers should be available for enlistment in the ranks. However, it is a well known fact that appointments of unqualified officers have been made in the C. E. F. and that such unqualified officers have gone overseas.

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SCHOOL BOARD MAKES SEVERAL APPOINTMENTS

Miss Alice M. Hoben of Gibson Takes Charge of Vocational Department — Doak School Vacant.

A special meeting of the School Board was held yesterday to consider prospective vacancies on the teaching staff and also to consider report of committee on the numerous applications on file.

Dr. VanWart was in the chair, and the other members in attendance included Mrs. Clark, Mr. Weddall, Mr. Spurdin, Mr. Lemont, Mr. Shute and Secretary Sampson. Several of the teachers have asked for transfer to other departments in view of resignations of some of the present staff. Miss Pinder, who has been in charge of the vocational department in York street school building, asked to be transferred to grade work in Charlotte street school and, as Miss Miriam Cadwallader has asked to be relieved from duty her department has been handed over to Miss Pinder. Included in other requests for transfer were the teachers at Morrison Mill school.

RAFTING AT DOUGLAS HAS BEEN STARTED

Crew of Ninety Men at Work There—Corporation Drives at Florenceville and The Barony.

Rafting operations at the Douglas Boom were begun by the St. John River Log Driving Company on Tuesday last. A crew of about ninety men is at work there. A large quantity of lumber is in the Sugar Island boom and prospects of cleaning up the river this season are good. The water is still high and all drives on the St. John river are making good progress.

Mr. G. C. Grant who is driving for the St. John River Log Driving Company, has crews at work at Florenceville and The Barony. Above Grand Falls there are several drives which have not yet reached the limits of the Driving Company. These are making satisfactory progress, however.

At the Mouth of the Nashwaak logs for the Nashwaak Pulp & Paper Co., have been rafted for some time. High water has caused a heavy run of logs at Marysville.

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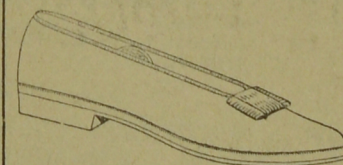
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
