EXCELLENT SPEECHES HEARD IN THE HOUSE

been more careful of its public domain.
A grave mistake had been made by a
former government in turning over a
large tract of valuable timber land to
the New Brunswick Railway Company.
This land was worth today between
five and six million dollars and yielded
an annual revenue of \$300,000. The
enhanced value was due to the great
development that had taken place
in the province since the transfer was
made. He thought New Brunswick
could be greatly benefited if the pulp
wood now shipped to the United
States was manufactured in the prov-
ince. It had been estimated that the
labor to manufacture into paper the
pulp wood now exported from the prov-
ince would support a population of one
hundred thousand people. This would
mean an increased subsidy from the
Federal government. He noticed that
there had been some comment on the
large amount that had been expended
by the Government in aid of railways.
He would like to know how much of
this amount had been expended in the
great revenue producing districts of
the North Shore. The hon. member
for Carleton had told of farmers in his
county hauling their produce fifteen
miles to market. He (McGrath) knew
of farmers on the North Shore who
were compelled to haul their produce
forty miles and over muddy roads at
that. They had the Caraquet railway
in Gloucester county but it was owned
by foreign capitalists and gave a tri-
weekly service. That meant a train
went down one week and tried to get
back the next. He wanted the Gov-
ernment to increase the revenue but
he did not think the whole load should
be put upon one horse. The hon. mem-
ber for Westmorland had suggested
some new forms of taxation but he had
forgotten to mention the canning in-
dustry which should be added to the
list. In closing he thanked hon. mem-
bers for the attention given him and
hoped his comments would have the
earnest consideration of the House.

Mr. Melanson.

Mr. Melanson said the Government
had been criticised for the removal of
a considerable number of officials. The
opposition evidently had forgotten that
in 1903 Mr. Hazen had appealed to the
people as the head of a coalition party.
On that account many Liberals had
voted for him and his party. Several
years afterward they had learned
their mistake and it was not surpris-
ing that they were making changes
among officials.

The financial measures taken by the
present Government had been made
necessary by the condition in which
the outgoing government had left pro-
vincial affairs. There had been criti-
cism because radical action had not
yet been taken in connection with the
crown lands or the highways, but the
delay was largely accounted for the
fact that the retiring government had
clung to office for 34 days after its de-
feat.

When the construction of the St.
John Valley railway had been begun
both parties had considered it an ex-
cellent undertaking, but the Liberals
at that time had not expected that so
much money provided for the construc-
tion of the railway would be diverted
from it.

The speaker referred to the con-
struction of the bridge at Reversing
Falls, St. John, and severely criticised
the late government for paying to
McVey & Sons \$10,000 in extras con-
trary to the recommendations of the
provincial engineer.

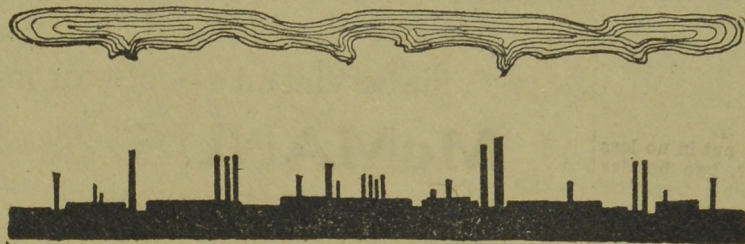
