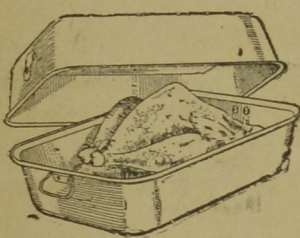

MANY EXEMPTIONS IN THE MONTREAL DISTRICT

Feeling at Ottawa That Some Military Tribunals Are Too Lenient--Matter Engaging the Attention of the Government
--Sir Robert Borden Expected to Make a Statement in Regard to It in His Toronto Speech.

Ottawa, Nov. 20. — Undue leniency on the part of certain military service tribunals towards applicants for exemption is engaging the attention of the government and the military advisory council at Ottawa and the course which it is intended to pursue in such cases may be the subject of a statement in the course of Sir Robert Borden's speech at Toronto tomorrow night.

The fact that in the Montreal districts 6,727 exemptions have been granted out of 6,962 applications and the further fact that the military representatives of the St. Boniface tribunals in Manitoba have appealed almost all the decisions made there is an indication that in some localities a wholesale system of exemption is being practiced. The act provides that appeals may be taken from the tribunal's decision to a superior court judge and thence, if necessary, to the central appeal judge, Mr. Justice Duff. That the government does not intend to stand quietly by while such discrimination goes on in certain localities, will be stated by the prime minister tomorrow night.

It is further believed that Sir Robert Borden will announce in his speech proposals for an increase in the allowance to the dependents of soldiers overseas.

12 Liberals, 8 Unionists.

Acclamations, officially announced tonight, stand twelve Liberals and eight Unionists with no change in the names mentioned last night. Official confirmation of the report by acclamation of Hon. Martin S. Burrell in Yale, was received tonight by the clerk of the crown in chancery. The nomination papers of Mr. Burrell's opponent were declared irregular for the reason that they were unattested by witnesses. In Portage La Prairie, however, Hon. Arthur Meighen will have an opponent in the person of F. Shurtliffe, whose papers which were yesterday considered irregular have been approved and the technicality overcome.

The task of endorsing candidates by the two leaders is now under way. The chief difficulty for the Unionists exists where more than one Unionist candidate is in the field as is the case in West Hamilton. For Sir Wilfrid Laurier the task is even more delicate owing to the conglomerate array of candidates opposing Union in many of the seats. There are several seats where Labor and Liberal men are running. In these cases the desire is not to offend Labor, on which the Liberals must depend in several other constituencies where there are no Liberals, makes the question of endorsement a difficult one.

LIVE STOCK FOR THE U. S.

Ottawa, Nov. 20.—The food controller announced tonight that until further notice licenses would not be required for the exportation of live stock to the United States. Instructions to this effect have been telegraphed by the commissioner of customs to collectors at the various ports of exit, and to all railroad traffic departments.

THE AGE LIMIT IS REDUCED

London, Nov. 21.—The House of Commons today unanimously agreed to an amendment to the electoral reform bill giving the vote to sailors and soldiers 19 years old, instead of 21, as fixed by the bill.

Some Trouble Develops.

Montreal, Nov. 20. — Legal proceedings are being taken against the returning officer in LaBelle county who, it is alleged, yesterday threw out the nomination papers of a prospective Unionist candidate, J. H. B. St. Pierre, a journalist, of Montreal, who had intended to oppose H. A. Fortier, the Liberal candidate. It is said the returning officer threw out Mr. St. Pierre's papers on grounds of irregularity and declared Mr. Fortier elected by acclamation.

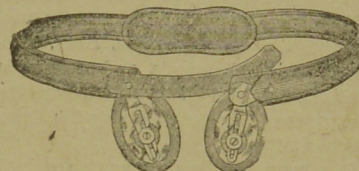

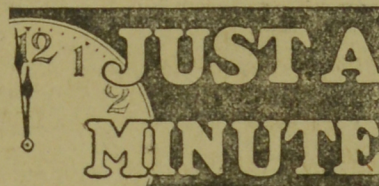
