Can Solemnize Marriages.
Rev. A. V. Morash of Sussex, has been registered under provincial statute to solemnize marriages.

Sold for \$500.

Partnership Formed.
Burpee Leigh Elgee, Herman Spurgeon Dykeman and Arnold DuVernet Dykeman of Jemseg, Queens county, have formed a co-partnership under the name of the Jemseg Milling Company to carry on a lumber business.

Operation at Boston.
Miss May Murphy of the staff of the Boston Five and Ten Cent store, was operated upon recently in Boston while on a visit to that city. She was taken suddenly ill during her visit there. The operation was successful.

Mid-week Market.
The mid-week market was not large and there were few price changes. Butter was quite plentiful at 45 cents a pound. Eggs were scarce at 55 and 60 cents a dozen. Pork sold at 20 and 22 cents; beef at 10 and 12 cents; potatoes at \$4; turnips at \$1 and carrots at \$1.50.

Heavy Penalty Imposed.
At a session of the police court held last night Magistrate Limerick imposed a heavy penalty in the case of assault in which a well known young man was the defendant. The penalty was a fine of one hundred dollars or twelve months in jail. The case was not contested. The fine was paid.

Registration in N. B.
Seventeen cards for service were signed yesterday, and 224 exemption papers were taken out, thus making a total registration of 241 for the day. To date there have been 1,405 service cards signed and 15,124 claims for exemption. The registration in the province to date reaches 16,529 with a number still to be put through.

236th Battalion in England.
An Ottawa despatch states that it is officially announced that the 236th Battalion MacLean Highlanders have safely arrived at an English port. Other units which arrived at the same time were drafts from the Royal Canadian Regiment, Halifax; 5th Royal Highlanders of Canada, Montreal; Army Medical Corps, Montreal.

Conference Closed Last Night.
The conference of representatives of municipal councils called by the Provincial Department of Agriculture closed at a late hour last night, a lengthy night session being held. There was full discussion on a number of important matters and important conclusions reached will be announced later by the department.

New Deputy Minister.
The Ottawa Journal announces that Mr. A. R. Tibbits has been appointed Deputy Minister of the Naval Service. The new deputy Minister is a son of the late James Tibbits of this city and a brother-in-law of Chief Justice Hazen. He was for many years clerk in the old People's Bank here. His old friends in Fredericton will be pleased to hear of his promotion.

Died of Wounds.
Mr. and Mrs. Robert Green of Summerfield, formerly of Fredericton have received word that their son, Pte Lea A. Green, had died of wounds received in battle. He enlisted as a private in the 104th Battalion, on November 9, 1915. He was in the trenches ten months without being wounded. Pte Green was 25 years of age, and besides a father and mother, leaves six brothers and two sisters.

Visit From the Stork.
Friends in York County will be pleased to learn of the arrival of a little son at the home of Mr. Charles Moore of Battleford, Sask. Mr. Moore is a native of Scotch Lake, and a brother of Messrs Adam and W. H. Moore of that place. His only son by his first wife is now at the front in France. Mr. Moore went west about fifteen years ago and is making good in his new home.

Wreck on N. T. R.
As the result of a wreck on the Transcontinental railway near Chipman traffic on the N.T.R. was interrupted. Twenty-one cars of a west-bound freight left the rails. The N.T.R. express, due to arrive at Moncton at 12.05 o'clock was cancelled, also the express due to leave for Edmundston. Wrecking crews are working and it is expected the line will be clear today. No one is reported injured.

Coming Poultry Show.
Mr. Seth Jones, poultry superintendent of Sussex, held a conference with members of the York and Sunbury Poultry and Pet Stock Association here last evening in regard to the approaching poultry show. He suggested some changes in the prize list which were accordingly made. Mr. Jones afterwards gave an informal talk on the care and housing of poultry, and was tendered a hearty vote of thanks by the meeting.

Died in New Hampshire.
Mrs. Harvey True received a telegram this morning from Manchester, N.H., announcing the death of her mother, Mrs. George A. Hoyt. It stated that her death was sudden and unexpected. The deceased was a native of Kingsclear but had resided at Manchester for twenty-five years. She is survived by one sister, Miss Maggie Moffat of Kingsclear, and a family of three daughters and two sons. The members of the family are Mrs. H. A. Matthews of Sharon, Mass., Mrs. Albert Smith of Manchester, Mrs. Harvey True of this city, Alfred Hoyt of Manchester and Maunsell of Boston. The body will arrive at Hoyt Station by the morning train on Saturday and will be interred at that place.

\$420,000 FROM YORK-SUNBURY IN VICTORY LOAN

That Amount Secured Up to Monday Night—Campaign will be Continued With Vigor.

It was reported at the Victory Loan headquarters for York and Sunbury counties this morning that up to Monday night the total amount of subscriptions to the Victory Loan in the two counties had been \$420,000. That figure places York-Sunbury before any other division of New Brunswick with the exception of St. John.

Country Does Well.

The country districts and towns and villages are responding particularly well to the call for money with which to carry on the war. Marysville, Fredericton Junction, Harvey and McAdam gave the canvassers an excellent reception.

The organization under the direction of Mr. J. D. Palmer is continuing its work and the expectation is that the total amount from York and Sunbury will considerably exceed the amount announced today. Fredericton is to be favored with an especial effort this week. There also is new ground in the counties to be covered.

Died in Hospital.

Edgar George Bleakney of Devon, died at an early hour this morning at the Victoria hospital of Bright's disease. The deceased was operated upon on Sunday last for strangulated hernia and following the operation was in a state of coma from which he did not recover. The funeral will take place from the late residence of the deceased, 2111 street, Devon, Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Rev. H. H. Ferguson assisted by Rev. A. D. McLeod will conduct the service. Interment will be made at Sunny Bank cemetery. The deceased was aged forty-three years. He is survived by his mother, one brother, Melbourne, and two sisters, Mrs. Angeline Colpitts and Miss Laura Bleakney, all of Devon.

WATCHING MINTO FOR ANY SPREAD OF SMALLPOX

Lumber Camp from Which Case Came is Under Quarantine—Coal Co. Provides Building.

Nothing new in the smallpox situation in the province of New Brunswick is reported today. Minto is the only place which is causing the health authorities much anxiety as it is thought that in the other sections the disease is under control. At Minto the full extent will not be known for some days during which the possible contacts will have a chance to develop.

Company Provides Hospital.

The Minto Coal Company has placed a building at the disposal of the health authorities for use as an isolation hospital should new cases occur.

From Lumber Camp.

The man discovered Monday who had a well advanced case of the disease had been in a lumber camp. Two other men escaped from Minto and returned to the same camp. They were followed up and a quarantine established. The man discovered in Minto had been there for four days and in general contact with people. A letter which he had sent through the Minto post office was traced and the mail fumigated.

Death at Fredericton Junction.

Mrs. Marion Pheasant died last night at her home, Fredericton Junction, after a lingering illness. She was aged seventy-six years. Two sons and four daughters survive. The sons are Frederick and Charles at home, and the daughters are Mrs. E. C. Morgan of Tracey, Mrs. Edward Mott of Rusagornish, Mrs. F. F. Brewer of Greenville, Me., and Ms. Bertie Getchell of Haverhill, Mass. The funeral will take place Thursday afternoon at 1 o'clock. Rev. Mr. Belyea will conduct the service.
